


As these words from a prayer used at the dedication of a stained glass window remind us:

# Larder at St Christopher's EAST BELFAST'S FOOD BANK UPDATE

The parishioners of St Columba's have been supporting The Larder for many years. This is a short update on current activities.

#### St Columba's Cash Donations

The total cash donation from St Columba's parishioners, since March 2020, is now almost £20,000. Therefore, we continue with a monthly "run rate" during the pandemic of giving about £1,000 per month to our local food bank.

#### **Meal Delivery**

A group of our parishioners have answered the call from The Larder to support clients who are in particular need. Since October 2020, this team has been preparing and freezing meals. Every other Friday they make deliveries to referred clients who are in palliative care, undergoing cancer treatment or suffering from chronic conditions.

By the end of January, we had cooked and delivered over 2,400 meals to 20 families.



#### **Old Freezers Needed**

Fresh ingredients and prepared meals are stored in two old freezers in my garage. Given the increasing volumes, it would be very helpful to have more capacity. If you are moving or updating your kitchen, and have an old freezer you don't need, we would be delighted if you could donate it to our project. A chest freezer, of any size, would be particularly useful.

Please contact me if you have a freezer you would like me to collect, or if you are interested in getting involved in cooking or delivering.

# Thought for the Month

I was born in 1937 so my early childhood spanned the years of the Second World War. We lived in a semi-detached house in Belfast and money was in short supply. Food was rationed and clothes and sweets were only available with limited coupons but to a child that was normal, and everyone was in the same situation.

My maternal grandparents had a farm outside Holywood so we had plenty of eggs, seasonable vegetables and butter that my grandmother made herself. One of my primary school teachers, whom I met in later life, said I was always

known by the staff as the pupil who brought them carefully wrapped

eggs or vegetables as a Christmas present.

I was staying at that farm the night of the horrendous bombing of Belfast and a bomb fell beside the farmhouse. My Grandmother picked me up out of bed, ran to the open fields and lay with me in a dry ditch till the morning. No one in the family was hurt and the farm survived.

In the middle years of life, we had the 'troubles' in Northern Ireland. Living in East Belfast life was fairly normal but my husband who worked as a transmission engineer on Black Mountain had to travel up the Falls and Springfield roads to get to work. The RUC said he would be safe as the IRA would have identified him as the TV man who

needed to get to work.

During the Troubles I was the volunteer head of Girl Guiding in Belfast. I planned with the Lord Mayor. Mr John Carson that he would hold a reception in the City Hall and present the Queen's Guide Badges to the girls and also to invite their parents and Guide Leaders for tea and buns in the Great Hall. Two hundred and fifty people replied that they would come. On the afternoon of the day a hunger striker from the Markets area died and Belfast was ablaze with burning buses. The Lord Mayor's secretary phoned to cancel but I spoke to John Carson and we agreed that we would both go to the City Hall just in case anyone turned up. Two hundred and forty people turned up and we carried out the original plan. The telephone kept ringing from Hillsborough but the Lord Mayor told his staff to tell the Secretary of State that he would see him when he had said goodbye to the young people who would be the future of his city.

The worst time was the week of the Ulster Worker's Strike. We had just moved to The Grange which was still a building site. My sister was in hospital so for part of the week I had five children to look after with the shops closed and electricity only one hour a day. My son Michael, a keen new Boy Scout was appointed chief fire lighter. Discarded bricks made a good fireplace and the ample supply of bits of wood gave us continual boiling water for tea and heat for the often-used frying pan. The busiest time of the day was the electricity hour. The freezer was opened for supplies and quickly closed. All five children were bathed, and the washing machine primed ready to roll. There was even time to do some baking. Michael was particularly disappointed when the strike was over. I was not. Now in the evening of life we have a problem again—Covid. This time I think it is the worst not because age makes one less resilient but because this time we have been deprived not of food, clothing or electricity but of contact with people. We had food with supermarket deliveries or cllick and collect. I never thought after restrictions eased that there would be so much pleasure from pushing a trolley round Tesco's and picking one's own fruit and vegetables. Bridge could be played online, books read by the dozen and lectures and Board Meetings on Zoom but oh how we missed contact with people.

Coffee for four people spaced out on my patio was bliss. A walk round Rowallan Gardens with tea and a sandwich outside the café was better than afternoon tea at the Ritz. We have ail learned a new way of life.

The common denominator between these periods of my life has been resilience. We have to step up and cope with whatever life brings but the overwhelming lesson from Covid has been the importance of people and how much we appreciate our families and friends.

Our sincere thanks to Joan for sharing this 'Thought' with us.

We look forward to his ministry. Our thanks and good wishes to Roberta and Gerald Macartney for their commitment to Mothers' Union over the last few years.

We will let you know the date of the next meeting when it has been confirmed.

### **Preparing for Lent**

**Lent** is a time for Christians around the world to prepare for the events of Holy Week and Easter. It begins with 40 days (not including Sundays) of fasting, spiritual discipline and repentance, as the purpose of the Lenten season is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ—to consider his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial, and resurrection. It begins on Ash Wednesday, which is on the 2nd March this year, and runs through to Palm Sunday, 10<sup>th</sup> April.



#### The significance of 40 in the Bible

The 40-day period of Lent is based on two episodes of spiritual testing in the Bible: the 40 years of wilderness wanderings by the Israelites after the exodus from Egypt (Numbers 33:38 and Deuteronomy 1:3) and the Temptation of Jesus after he spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11; Mark 1:12-13; Luke 4:1-13).

In the Bible, the number 40 holds special significance in the measurement of time, and many other important events revolve around it. During the flood, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights (Genesis 7:4, 12, 17; 8:6). Moses fasted on the mountain for 40 days and nights before God gave the Ten Commandments (Exodus 24:18; 34:28; Deuteronomy 9). The spies spent 40 days in the land of Canaan (Numbers 13:25; 14:34). The prophet Elijah travelled for 40 days and nights to reach the mountain of God in Sinai (1 Kings 19:8). (Extract from Mary Fairchild's Preparation for Lent)

This year, we have a very unusual task for Lent – we will explain more in the next edition of The Columban. In the meantime, we suggest that you prepare by purchasing a small notebook and await further information!

This is something that all the family can take part in, and we would like to encourage you to come along to church so that we can make progress together as we prepare for Easter.

The Clergy will make reference to this new task/challenge during sermons each Sunday during Lent, so come along and discover more, as well as understand how this observance can help you have a better relationship with God.

We hope that you will enjoy this time of preparation!
