#### Jesus - the Light of the World

As we cautiously emerge from the shadows of the pandemic, we give thanks for the great resilience shown by our parishioners and local community. The pandemic has changed so many aspects of our lives. Parishioners have "stepped up and stepped out in faith" in so many courageous ways. Friendships have deepened, random acts of kindness have been increasing, love for our families is stronger and our thanks are immeasurable. Our church has strengthened and developed.

So many sacrifices have been made to keep ourselves and others safe as we live out Jesus' command to love God and Neighbour. Such actions have helped enormously to keep parishioners safe and to prevent many infections.

At the end of a long dark winter, we welcome the increased daylight of these spring days. As people of faith, we give thanks that the light of Christ is the strongest of all and cannot be extinguished.

#### **The New Church Roof**

John 8:12 "Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light of life."

Wilson & Mawhinney completed the reroofing and other associated improvement works to our church, preserving and enhancing its architectural heritage, whilst also maintaining a safe place of worship with a successful completion on 1st December 2021. Through their hard work and great attention to detail, this essential work on our church was



completed six weeks ahead of schedule. Throughout the duration of the reroofing contract Wilson & Mawhinney demonstrated great accommodation to us, enabling us to have use of the church building for our Sunday services. The foreman and staff were extremely efficient and at all times most courteous.

I thank the Diocesan Surveyor Chris McCollum in his management of this project. He maintained excellent communication at every stage of the project and worked closely with the Select Vestry, the Roof sub committee and myself to complete

this complex project whilst remaining within the necessary financial constraints. His professional advice was always clear and most helpful at every stage which enabled us to get all the necessary approvals at every stage without difficulty.

While the church was covered in scaffolding, we were able to carry out a number of repairs to the stonework and the East Stained-glass window.

They also replaced the parish lawn at the front door of the church, which is now growing and looks healthy!

The fabric of our beautiful church building has now been protected for many years. Plans will be made later in the year to have the interior of the church painted.

It is a wonderful blessing to see the church looking so smart and tidy. I thank John Macpherson, the Honorary Secretary of the Select Vestry, the Select Vestry, the Roof sub committee, the Finance and Property committee members as well as many others who contributed both of their time, talents and finance to complete this work in such a timely manner and with the minimum of disruption to parish life and services. As a parish, we are extremely grateful to Bryn Harris and Leonard Pugh for their most generous legacies which enabled us to start this work much earlier than planned. I also thank our neighbours for their patience and understanding whilst the work was ongoing.

The dedication of our new church roof will take place during our Patronal Festival Sung Eucharist on Sunday 12th June at 10.30am. I am delighted that Archbishop Robin Eames will be the preacher at this service and that he will also dedicate our new roof. This will be a joyful day of thanksgiving for us following the completion of all the work.

#### **Services**

Our church services have continued with all of the necessary Covid Guidelines strictly adhered to. We continue to provide a safe place for worship. We encourage everyone to get back into the routine of regular weekly worship in church. A warm welcome awaits you!

While we have all taken great benefit from the Facebook pre-recorded weekly services, there is nothing quite like the full experience of actually being surrounded by live music in the church. I thank Mark Ryan, Alan Boyd, David Deane, Charles Auchmuty, Jonathan Kelly, the organists and the cantors who joined Canon Smyth and myself for these weekly recordings for our Facebook page throughout the past two years.

We are so fortunate to have such magnificent music to encourage us in our faith at our services. I thank Dr Joe McKee, Brian Clements the parish choir and the cantors: Lynda Barrett, Jamie Blair, Morven Bremner, Lauren Cheshire, Ronnie Drury, Eibhlin Eddy, Adam Gadd, Timothy Howe, Sam Magee, Ruth McCartney, Christine McKee, Rebecca Moore, Claire Murray and Mark Ryan for all their hard work.

I thank those who carefully prepare the church for worship each week – Murray and Pam Hunter ( who served as Honorary Sacristans until their recent retirement); John and Yvonne Robb (who recently succeeded them and have settled well into this new role); John and Helen Proctor who assist with the no parking cones on Thursday mornings and carry out regular tidying of the church grounds including the Garden of Rest; Adrian and Patricia Clements together with Minster Cleaning and the cleaning committee ensure that our buildings are in a good state of cleanliness; and Jim Stevenson who is assisted by David Kelly prepares the risk assessments and the seating plan which are revised on a regular basis. I thank our Thursday churchwardens, Geoff Launchbury and Angela Kerr and our churchwardens Martin Moore and Scott Rutherford for ensuring that all the necessary preparations have been done both before and after each service. At each of our services we have lovely flowers in the Sanctuary, and on festival occasions our church is beautifully decorated. I thank Eleanor Launchbury and Patricia Clements together with those who assist them.

In June, we celebrated the 125th anniversary of our parish church, when a visit from the Primate, Archbishop John McDowell to preach at our Sunday service, was a huge blessing to us all.

In October, we welcomed the Reverend Canon Jono Pierce from St Finnian's to preach at our Harvest Thanksgiving service. Our children made leaf wreaths for the service which were delightfully enjoyed by all.

We celebrated the 75th anniversary of our Mothers' Union branch with a service of Holy Communion in October. Group leader Barbara Laverty was delighted to welcome members to the service, where a beautiful hymn written by Angela Kerr was sung and enjoyed by those in attendance.

**In December, we held a Christingle service.** This was a 'first' for us and follows an old Anglican tradition of making a Christingle to light during the service. Everyone who came along with a Christingle enjoyed the service.

We reluctantly brought our Family Communion services to a conclusion with the full agreement of those who were attending them. The numbers are now significantly higher at the 10.30am service on the third Sunday, which includes the Sunday School children.

#### **Finance**

Isaiah 9:2 "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned."

I thank parishioners for their generous financial support to St. Columba's throughout the challenges of this past year. This is clearly reflected in our financial accounts which show a respectable surplus. This is in addition to generous financial support for the Church Roof Appeal, Hall Fund and Charity and Mission Envelopes.

Parishioners who currently only use Free Will Offering envelopes are encouraged to consider Standing Order as a means of contributing to the work of St Columba's. This is the easiest and safest way to contribute as no cash is involved, and there is no need to hunt for money to fill envelopes. It also allows the Select Vestry to budget in advance, and it protects the bank lodgement team as they don't have to handle excess amounts of cash.

We have also contributed £1,250 from our Charity and Mission Envelopes to these local charities: The Black Santa Appeal, Alzheimer's Society, Children's Cancer Fund, Lagan Search & Rescue, NI Air Ambulance, PIPS, St John Ambulance, Stand by Me and Marie Curie. They were most appreciative of your support.

We also claimed £46,219 in Gift Aid in 2021-2022. This is a significant part of our income, for which we are extremely grateful. If you are able to assist us in this way, please contact Karen Patterson in the parish office for more advice and assistance, or download a form from our parish website, complete it and return to her.

During the pandemic, we were successful in sending £3,030 to Christian Aid under the careful guidance of Yvonne Robb, Imelda Shephard and Joyce Stevenson. This has been a wonderful achievement during difficult circumstances, and we thank everyone involved for their generous support.

We also thank Maureen Beckwith, who has been making and selling jars of her very popular marmalade, and donating the money received to the Church Roof fund. This has been a wonderful way to help the fundraising, and those who have enjoyed the marmalade are most grateful to Maureen!

I thank the Honorary Treasurer, Gillian Sadlier, the Assistantt Honorary Treasurer, Victor Dukelow, the Finance sub committee, the Bank Lodging team, The parish administrator and Jack Dunlop for all their hard work looking after all our financial matters so efficiently. I also thank our Auditor, Nigel Skillen for carrying out the audit so efficiently.

#### The Larder

#### Psalm 119:105 "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path."

The Larder at St Christopher's in Mersey Street has benefitted immensely from the generosity of St Columba's parishioners. **During the last year, we have been contributing approximately £1,000 per month.** We also have a team of parishioners who are preparing and freezing meals for those who are



in palliative care, undergoing cancer treatment or suffering from chronic

conditions. This has been carefully coordinated by Brian Acheson, who has been arranging food deliveries, storing the prepared meals and taking our financial donations to the Larder on a regular basis. We are most grateful to Brian for sharing his time, organising skills and dedication to helping those in our community who are desperately in need. We also thank everyone who assists Brian by preparing meals or contributing

financially. It is wonderful to see what a difference this makes to those in need.

We contributed 50% of the loose plate collections from our Christmas services to the Larder, with the other 50% going to the Black Santa Appeal at St Anne's Cathedral.

#### **Parish Organisations**

Despite the lock-down, some of our organisations held activities when the regulations were eased. Some parishioners met for socially distanced walks, some met for coffee in each other's gardens and others provided telephone and email support to their members. It was so encouraging to see the parish working for each other and the community in such difficult times.

One of the socially distanced parish activities we held was the Sunday School Prizegiving and Picnic in the grounds of Campbell College on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> September. It was an immense privilege to be able to use the



beautiful grounds to spread out and enjoy a picnic lunch, while enjoying the conversations and laughter as people had an opportunity to spend a short time together. Being outdoors meant that the children could play games and receive their Sunday School gifts safely.

We returned to Campbell College on Saturday 4th December for our Sunday School Christmas Party which was very well attended. We used the outdoor classroom and the children enjoyed doing a Treasure Hunt in the grounds before the

arrival of a special guest! I thank the Headmaster and the Board of Governors for kindly granting us permission to have the benefit of the magnificent grounds on both occasions.

Our PAUSE group meets at the Stormont Hotel each month. It has been wonderful to see parishioners meeting for coffee, scones and sharing conversations with each other. I thank Eileen Anderson for organising these increasingly popular gatherings. Everyone is welcome.

We are grateful to Betty Gregory from the Art Club who designed our lovely parish Christmas card. The Art Club members organised a display at our Patronal Festival service in June and again on the 5th December in church to celebrate the 1500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of St Columba. These were enjoyed by those attending church on both occasions.

Our Railway & Model club have been creating a vast range of models at home for their club. We have been given a few hints about what they have been working on, and we cannot wait to see the results!

#### **Confirmation Service**

On Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> June at 7pm The Bishop of Down and Dromore, The Right Reverend David McClay will administer the Rite of Confirmation in St. Columba's where thirteen parishioners will be confirmed. This is most encouraging news, and we look forward to supporting the candidates as they prepare to become full communicant members of the church. The classes will commence immediately after Easter. It is a great privilege for me to share ministry in St. Columba's with our dedicated and conscientious assistant priests: Canon Ken Smyth and Canon Walter Laverty. Last month, when drawing attention to the fact that the month, March, was named after the Roman god of war, none of us realised that the month would coincide with the outbreak of a brutal war against the Ukrainian nation when the Russian armed forces invaded the country. Much continues to be written about that devastating war and its consequences for millions of displaced people. Some prayers in this copy of the Columban focus on the destructive nature of war, and more positively, include prayers for peace.

April includes Holy Week and Easter, when Christians think about the violence perpetrated against Christ and many other people, but also celebrate the significance of the Resurrection.

During the month of April, the Easter General Vestry – the annual general meeting of the Parish, is scheduled to take place. You may wish to use the appropriate prayer in the days and weeks before that important meeting.

#### Prayers for the Ukraine, its people, and freedom from the threat of war

Lord, lead us from death to life – from falsehood to truth. Lead us from despair to hope – from fear to trust. Let peace fill our hearts, our world and our universe. Let us dream together, pray together, and work together to build one world of peace and justice for all. **Amen**

Help those in positions to influence events, to discover and promote means of reconciling differences. God of peace and justice, we pray for the people of Ukraine. We pray for those who fear tomorrow, that your Spirit of comfort would draw near to them. We pray for those with power over war or peace, that they may have wisdom, discernment and compassion. Above all, we pray for children and their families, at risk and in fear, that you would grant them a sense of security. We pray in the name of Jesus, the Prince of Peace. **Amen** (Prayer of Archbishops of Canterbury and York)

God of hope and mercy, we pray for all victims of violence and natural disasters. Help us to provide practical help to those in need. Strengthen the devastated and console the grieving. Bless those engaged in disaster relief efforts with safety and courage. Help all people of good will to respond to need, with compassion and generous hearts. **Amen**

"Tested by the Cross"

At our 8.00pm services during Holy Week, we are delighted that Canon Ken Smyth will be our preacher. He writes...



Recent events in Europe, and instances of turmoil and suffering globally, either because of the destructive forces of nature, including the pandemic known as Covid 19, OR the cruel actions of individual human beings, remind me that we live in a dysfunctional world. The Christian faith challenges us to show that the light of Christ can shine in the darkest of places.

The account of the journey of Jesus in Holy Week is familiar to most of us. In some respects, He lived in a violent and divided world not dissimilar to our world today. As we think of contemporary events, and those of the first Holy Week, I am aware that we can be 'Tested by the Cross.' Hopefully, if circumstances allow, we can spend time together in St. Columba's in the most sacred week of the Christian year and explore the significance of the events which led to the death of Christ at Calvary on Good Friday.

#### **Three Hours Devotions**

At our Three-Hour Devotions service on Good Friday, we are delighted to welcome back the Very Reverend Henry Hull, Dean of Down Cathedral. Dean Hull is well known to us as he preached at our Holy Week services in 2017.

Dean Henry writes...



I am really looking forward to sharing in the Three hour Meditation in St Columba's on Good Friday.

Each year I personally like to re-read the account of the last days of Jesus from Maundy Thursday through to Easter Sunday and take time to reflect on all that happened. I would love to invite you to join me between 12.00 and 3.00 when I will select some of the incidents following the arrest of Jesus and ending with His last words from the cross.

It will be mixtures of a reading; a reflection; silence; and prayer. The las hour from 2.00 - 3.00 will focus specifically on the last words of Jesus from the cross.

If you can come for three hours, it would be wonderful but each meditation will stand alone and so you can drop in for as much or as little time as you are able.



#### **DEC UKRAINE HUMANITARIAN APPEAL**

We are part of the Disaster's Emergency Committee (DEC), which unites 15 member charities who are experts in humanitarian aid and specialists in different areas of disaster response.

The DEC launches appeals during times of monumental suffering, which is the case in Ukraine right now. Please donate to this vital appeal and help us reach families and communities in Ukraine and the border countries.

#### The Myths and Legends of Easter



Following the 40 days of fasting and repentance comes Holy Week. Each day of Holy Week holds a significance to Christians as they lead up to the events of Easter.

Images of Easter include lambs, Easter eggs, white lilies and bunnies. The relevance comes from traditions steeped in history. During Holy Week, early Christians were forbidden to eat chicken, eggs and ham, however the hens

continued to lay eggs! The eggs were marked to show which were oldest and to be consumed first after Holy Week, and this may be the reason behind decorating eggs at Easter. They have been a universal symbol in many religions across the millennia, symbolizing new life, rebirth, and fertility.

The reference to lamb in Christianity goes back to the book of Genesis, when Abraham was asked to sacrifice His son. In Exodus, when Egypt experienced terrible plagues and the deaths of firstborn sons, the Jews painted sacrificed lamb's blood on their doors so that God would 'pass over' their homes while punishing sinners. Early Jews, after offering a lamb as a sacrifice, celebrated Passover by eating lamb to mark this occasion. Across history, lambs were also the most readily available livestock after a long winter. The association of Jesus as "the lamb of God" is very significant, as it ties together the shepherds who visited the baby Jesus in the manger, the innocence of a new-born lamb and the sacrificial lamb of the Passover. It also solidifies the image of God as the Good Shepherd, watching over His flock. In past centuries it was considered a lucky omen to meet a lamb at Faster time.





White lilies decorate churches and homes at Easter. In early paintings, the Angel Gabriel is seen handing a bouquet of white lilies to the Virgin Mary. In other paintings, the saints are bringing vessels full of lilies to Mary and the baby Jesus. It is said that beautiful white lilies sprang up in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus wept in the last hours before He was betrayed by Judas. Sometimes known to some as the "white-robed apostles of hope," white lilies are

believed to symbolize the purity and innocence of Christ. The white colour signifies peace, hope, and purity. This beautiful, fragrant flower emerges from an ugly bulb planted in a ground, which acts as a symbol of the resurrection and new life, just as Jesus emerged from the tomb after His brutal death. The Easter lilies act as a reminder to celebrate this joyful season of renewal and rebirth. The trumpet shape of the Easter lily also fit into the image of a trumpet



sounding the message that Jesus had risen and so loss becomes a form of rebirth too. Lilies are mentioned in both the Old and New Testaments of the Bible and are also associated with funeral services as they portray the innocence that has been restored to the soul of the departed.

For many years a parishioner, Caroline Cramp, and her family have supplied the large lilies for the sanctuary on Easter morning. In 2015, Caroline and her family kindly gifted a new Rose Window in the West End of the church, which incorporates Easter Lilies and was designed by David Esler. David describes the window as follows:

"The two Easter lilies, (upper section) represent purity, hope and life capturing the spiritual essence of Easter and combine as a reminder of the flowers provided by the family over the years for the Easter services. Centrally the suggestion of a rising sun reminds us of Christ's resurrection while stars of gold and silver symbolizing dreams on a 'blue and dim background' are inspired by the W.B. Yeates poem, 'The Cloths of Heaven'. The gold and silver light is interwoven with the beautiful blues of the sky at morning, noon and night. In the bottom left hand panel is a mouse that is a personal reference to a family member."

This beautiful window allows us to reflect on the importance of lilies at this important time of year, and we thank the Cramp family for their kindness over the years.







The hare was an Egyptian symbol of fertility. Rabbits and hares produce many off-spring and are thought to be a perfect symbol of springtime, as the northern



hemisphere emerges from the long dark days of winter. The happy, bouncing bunnies symbolise birth, fertility and a joy for life. However, the "Easter Bunny," who visits children on Easter morning, was an invention of German Protestants; the Osterhase or "Easter Hare," brought eggs and sweets to "good children," in the same way that Santa Claus brought gifts to well-behaved youngsters.

After 40 days of fasting, which often includes not eating chocolate during Lent, it is little wonder that the shops are full of chocolate eggs, chocolate bunnies and chocolate lambs!

We are still keepin' her rollin'.


