## Thought for the Month

August is a golden time; it is a time for reflection when we can remember.

My thoughts go to my father; he had the worst of beginnings, his mother died when he was three and his father when he was seven and he lived in an orphanage where

the food was sparse and there were few luxuries. When he was fourteen he realised that he must do something with his life or he would end up on the scrap heap so he joined the Navy (even though he

was only 4'11" they accepted him). They recognised that he was 'teachable', they educated him and he loved it and until the end of his life, no book was safe, he read all the time and his knowledge was unbelievable - he always wanted to teach and often said,

#### 'Education carries light on your shoulders'.

He learned to play the piano and our house was always full of music and singing,

It was three weeks before he knew the 1st World War had started as he was at sea on the Dogger Bank but the radio signal was so

weak it didn't reach. He was involved in battle and was shipwrecked twice. The first one was with the sinking of HMS Russell which sank with great loss of life, my father survived by swimming for seven hours coming ashore in Malta. Before seeking help he took the money out of his money belt, which he had saved to buy an engagement ring, and dried it. The following year he was shipwrecked again, this time in the North Sea - that was a three hour stint. He was involved as a sniper in the battle of Gallipoli.

He was on a ship which brought the Russian royal family out of Russia. He had to learn how to dance so that he could partner the princesses if required - his learning partner was a brush. He told us how beautiful the ladies were and how well they conducted themselves.

I never heard him talk about his origins, but he always loved the Navy. He died at 56 his lungs never recovered from the damage done by the oil and seawater on that long swim, he suffered a lot. I asked him once how he managed to do it he said

'Well I swam a bit and when I got tired I floated'.

Our sincere thank to Jacqueline for sharing this 'Thought' with us.

We are entering the seventh month of the old Roman calendar – SEPTember, which will be followed by the eighth month – OCTober, the ninth month – NOVember and the tenth month – DECember.

The Roman calendar began in March. The first day of each month, was known as the Kalends – hence the contemporary use of the word 'calendar'. There were ten months in the year plus two of our winter months, considered to be a neutral period. In our society and country, September marks the end of summer and the beginning of autumn. In fact, the words in the Irish language for this month – Mean Fomhair – are translated as 'the middle of autumn.' or 'harvest.'

For many parishioners, this month marks a new beginning. Schools and colleges are reopening – a new experience for some – while others may be setting out on a new adventure and possibly job, in life. These themes will be evident in this month's selection of prayers, together with other topics of current interest. Included also are prayers that could be used in particular by children of primary school age.

# Visit a Hidden Gem Armagh Robinson Library



I recently attended a wonderful event in Armagh – the launch of a fundraising scheme for Armagh Robinson Library. Pupils from Armagh's Drelincourt Primary School were present. The historic primary school is first to sign up to the new Armagh Robinson Library campaign – adopt-a-book or adopt-a-shelf.

A hidden gem set within the Georgian streets of the city, Armagh Robinson Library was founded in 1771 by Archbishop Richard Robinson, who saw it as embodying the 18th-century spirit of enlightenment, discovery and learning. He wanted his books to be accessible to the public of all classes and creeds for enjoyment, research and inspiration. It is this tradition and ethos that the current library staff, Governors and Guardians are seeking to protect and are inviting locals and tourists, booklovers, academics, students, schools, families and businesses to take up the opportunity of sponsoring a book, a bespoke selection or a whole shelf.

Armagh Robinson Library has over 40,000 literary gems – from medieval Books of Hours and early editions of the Bible to classic literature, books on science, mathematics, art, music and travel. It is a truly international collection with works in over eight languages including highly prized texts in Irish. One of the collection stars is Jonathan Swift's own annotated copy of Gulliver's Travels, dating from 1726.

The Drelincourt School was founded in 1738 by the widow of Peter Drelincourt, who came from Northern France to make Armagh his home. The infant primary school is sponsoring a 1699 theological book written in French by Peter's father, Charles Drelincourt and published in Amsterdam. Appropriately, the five children present on the day of the launch, are all from newcomer families. None have English as their first language.

Archbishop John McDowell, Chairman of the Library's Governors and Guardians, said,

"The Library is an important cultural asset for the City of Armagh, indeed for the whole of Ireland. Archbishop Robinson may have founded the Library in the eighteenth century, yet it is up to every generation to sustain it and find new ways to make it relevant in their lives. I can think of nothing more fitting than for the children of the Drelincourt School to be the first to support this important scheme to augment Robinson's endowment. Book and shelf adoption will allow everyone who visits and appreciates the Library to establish their own personal bond with this special place and ensure that it continues to benefit future generations."

- 3. Please use your new church envelopes from January onwards, and not before.
- 4. Please carefully consider changing to Standing Order if you have not already done so, to help us with this project.
- 5. All new households joining the parish will be supplied with a Standing Order form instead of church envelopes.
