
Eternal God,



OUR STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

Our stained glass windows in St Columba's are magnificent. But do we try to do more than simply admire their beauty and feel comforted by their familiarity? Throughout Christian times, stained glass windows have enhanced places of worship in Europe and Asia. Their presence in our churches forms part of our Christian Heritage, and we continue to value them highly today.

In medieval times, from the 5th to 15th centuries, ordinary folk could not read or write, and it was not until the 1470s that Caxton printed and sold the first books in England. Even then, only a miniscule proportion of the population could actually read these books and by 1790, historians estimate that still only very basic literacy had reached rather less than 50% in the general





Most of us like to have illustrations, drawings and photographs with our reading material - they help us interpret and understand more fully the written For those early churchgoers, the windows were their illustrations, drawings, photographs and texts; they could see and absorb the messages they contained with little if any reading skills. Their constant presence and inspiration made places of worship more comfortable and comforting for everyone, with all the familiar stories depicted all around the buildings. And they served to enhance readings, sermons and prayers offered on their behalf by the clergy.

We too can benefit in this way; it is not long ago that Canon Ken Smith in his sermon told us the story of Dorcas, or Tabitha as she was known. In fact, there are two windows in St Columba's which depict her work – one of them is devoted entirely to her story. Do you know which one it is?

Today, we are lucky to be able to read the Bible, service sheets and prayer books for ourselves. For those of us who love the written word, perhaps

we rely less than we should on the wonderful pictorial stories and vivid messages our windows tell, and certainly less than those worshippers long ago with no reading skills. It is surely a marvel to consider this and to contemplate the depth and sophistication of the communication that the designers incorporated into their art, for the benefit of every worshiper down the ages.

A book published by the parish, entitled STAINED GLASS WINDOWS in St COLUMBA'S CHURCH, has been written to help us to revisit and study this part of our heritage. There are 20 stained glass windows in St Columba's – 15 in the Church and 5 more in the porches and the Choir Vestry. They are part of our treasury and heritage. The publication serves to remind us how each of the windows – which were donated in recognition of individuals who have served the parish in special ways, or in commemoration of activities and events – tells well loved stories from the Bible and the Liturgy. At the same time, they remind us of the work of those who have gone before – they must never be forgotten.

The book also tells how these artefacts are made and in doing so, help us to understand not only how subtle and full of meaning they are, but also how much work and scholarship goes into the design and manufacture of each one. They are powerful spiritual tools if we allow them into our conscience, but like anything else of great value, we have to work at them and on ourselves to get the best out of them.


The publication, prompted by St Columba's 1,500th Birthday and the focus of the Heritage Group in the church, has taken only six months to write from its inception at the end of October 2021 until a final draft was received by the Rector. In the interim, the research was initiated and completed, the photographs taken and processed, the text written and edited and the services of a superb computer layout specialist, Stephen Cullen, harnessed - all involving much time and resource. The Vestry asked the writers to assign the copyright to the parish which they have done, and the printers draft was received towards the end of May when it was donated to the church; the book is the result of this donation.

Since then, the Vestry has finalised the publication and it is to be issued on 2nd October 2022.

Book Review

Stained-Glass Windows in St Columba's Church Authors: Alasdair and Wendy MacLaughlin

I was pleased to be asked by the Rector to review this book, especially as I have known Alasdair for many years through our membership of the Ulster Society of Organists and Choirmasters.



Alasdair and Wendy begin by introducing us to the world of stained-glass, providing considerable information on the intricate process of design and construction of stained-glass windows, together with some useful-to-know technical terms, thereby affording the viewer a deeper appreciation of this art. A potted history of the companies that installed the stained-glass windows is included for good measure. Starting at the Great East Window, above the altar, the authors take us on a clockwise journey around the church as they discuss each window, which is reproduced in the book in striking detail and colour. The inclusion of a floor plan and window numbering assists the process. Alasdair's experience in the design and manufacture of stained-glass is used to highlight aspects of the windows that might not be noticed by the casual observer, such as the dramatic effect of contrasting colours in Window 7, which is enhanced further when viewed through the Baptistery arch.

The authors' description of each window is detailed, including helpful information on construction and on the biblical setting, yet sufficiently succinct to hold the interest. For example, at Window 4 on the south wall, we are invited to contemplate the expressions on the faces of the figures, which encapsulate their wonder and awe in the presence of the infant Jesus; while, at Window 13 on the north wall, we are encouraged to consider the perspective of the floor tiles on the left and right lancets. The authors also quote inscriptions, some of which are difficult to read from the floor, and rightly draw our attention to the quality of the calligraphy, for example, in Window 12. Additionally, there are some anecdotes that provide a broader perspective, for example, in regard to the Book of Kells, depicted in the quatrefoil atop Window 8.

While our attention is drawn frequently to the impressive 'Great' windows, this book reminds us not to overlook the beauty contained in the smaller windows above them, even though the detail may be difficult to discern. Window 8a is one example and the image in the book conveys superbly the vibrant colours of this little stained-glass gem. Here, again, Alasdair and Wendy provide an interesting anecdote about the window's subject matter. An example of what might be termed a window-within-a-window can be seen in Window 10, where the authors direct us to the little blue circle at the top of the central lancet which contains the Dove of Peace. Finally, we are reminded of the small windows in the North and South porches and in the Choir Vestry. All of these can be easily overlooked, yet their beauty invites us to pause, reflect and admire them.

Throughout the pages of this book the reader will be impressed by the quality of the photography, which conveys both the complexity and simplicity of the stained-glass windows within the church. St. Columba's has a beautiful and elegant interior which would be diminished greatly were it not for the quality and quantity of its stained-glass. Through their painstaking research and focus on detail, Alasdair and Wendy call our attention to what is around and above us as we enter our church and encourage us to appreciate the beauty of the stained-glass that surrounds us: light, art, colour and calligraphy. For anyone seeking more information about the windows, this book, beautifully adorned with a water colour painting of the church by Ms Liz Cole of the Art Club, will be an indispensable guide.

Larder at St Christopher's EAST BELFAST'S FOOD BANK UPDATE

The parishioners of St Columba's have been supporting The Larder for many years. This is a short update on our support to date, and some changes that Louise Ferguson, the leader at St Christopher's, is making in how the food bank operates.

St Columba's Cash Donations

The total cash donations from St Columba's parishioners, since March 2020, now stand at almost £25,000.

Meal Delivery

A group of our parishioners have answered the call from the Larder to support clients who are in particular need. Since October 2020, this team has been preparing and freezing meals. Every other Friday they make deliveries to referred clients who are in palliative care, undergoing cancer treatment or suffering from chronic conditions.

By the end of January, we had cooked and delivered over almost 4,000 meals to 25 households.



Changes at The Larder

For the two years that Covid impacted us, the Larder moved to a very simple-to-operate model: making-up and delivering bags of groceries (as prescribed by the Trussell Trust) to households referred by recognised third-party organisations. Whilst this allowed support to clients to be maintained, it limited the relationships that could be built up between volunteers and clients.

Membership scheme now operating

The Larder has returned to being a physical shop and now operates a membership model for what were previously known as "clients". A once-off payment of a modest subscription entitles members to a weekly shop. The shopping list in the photo is for an individual member. These items can be purchased for £3 – about 10% of retail prices. Similar shopping lists exist for families (£5) and large families (£7).

The new model builds commitment and supports the client in budgeting and making good choices about food.





Membership for Volunteers

Louise's vision is for volunteers to join with clients in becoming members. She is in the process of establishing an "ecorange". Volunteers (and supporters like us at St Columba's) will be able to become members of a refill shop. Members will be able to reduce

their packaging waste by purchasing dry-goods from vertical hoppers and taking purchases home in re-usable containers.

Louise is an exceptional leader and extremely thoughtful and creative in how she is addressing the needs of the community she serves. I would encourage everyone to visit her and her team in St Christopher's to understand better what she is doing and how we can become more closely involved.

A note from the Treasurer ENERGY COSTS

Dear Parishioners,

This is a short note to give you some information on how the Select Vestry is addressing a matter that is now very frequently in the news – energy costs.

In recent years our annual energy bill has been around £10,000. This appears in our annual accounts as "Heating & Lighting" and covers all our natural gas and electricity bills. These costs usually consume between 3 and 4% of our income. Last year, they represented our 4th largest expenditure after, employee costs; property maintenance and charitable giving.

Increases in 2022

In the last six months alone, the cost of natural gas has doubled (from £6.7 to £13.4 per kWh). Further increases are anticipated.

You can expect to see "Heating & Lighting" appearing as a much larger

cost in our 2022 accounts - perhaps closer to £20,000.

The Rector and Select Vestry are committed to ensuring that the church and hall remain warm and comfortable places to visit – the new roof certainly helps in this regard, as does regular maintenance of our boilers.

In addition, we have maximised the benefits of our charitable status. We avail of the lowest available VAT rate on our utilities and avoid the Climate Change Levy in relation to gas and electricity.

I expect that this subject will feature large in my report to the Easter Vestry.


