


RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioner,

As I write this letter, plans are well advanced for the Coronation of King Charles III in Westminster Abbey on Saturday 6th May. This will be a most significant and important occasion in the life of our Nation and the Commonwealth. For so many people like myself, it will be our first time witnessing a Coronation Service.



The Coronation is deeply rooted in tradition. The service, which will be conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, will reflect the King's role in society today and will also look to the future. I am delighted that Girl Choristers from the Chapel Choir at Methodist College Belfast will be singing at the Coronation. This is such a great honour and immense privilege for them all. They will be accompanied by two members of St. Columba's who can often be seen as cantors in our choir: their Director of Music, Ruth McCartney and Lynda Rolston, who teaches in the Music Department at Methody. Graeme McCullough, College Organist, and one of our Guest Organists at St Columba's, will also be going. I assure them all of our prayerful good wishes with their rehearsals and also their travelling.

Throughout these weeks we will be praying for The King, The Queen Consort, members of the Royal Family, our Nation and the Commonwealth. We will also in our services be focusing on Christ, The Servant King who came to serve and encourages us to serve one another. This is an opportunity for us to reflect on our own service to one another and also our service to the community. Are there new and fresh ways that we can consider and share the hope of the Resurrection through service in our community? Could we assist as a volunteer with a local charity?

So many people similar to myself have a unique opportunity to learn about the significance and all the symbolism of the Coronation Service in these weeks and months. Please see the informative article written by our Parish Administrator Karen Patterson in this magazine.

Throughout the weekend of the Coronation there will be opportunities in St. Columba's to reflect on many aspects of our community life and all those who generously serve as volunteers in so many different capacities.

Coronation regalia

Many of the items in the crown jewels collection are only used on special occasions. A coronation is one such occasion and you will probably see the following during the ceremony if you are watching on television.



St Edward's crown

This solid gold crown weighs 2.23kg (nearly 5lbs) and is set with precious stones and fringed, with ermine. A coronation is the only time it is worn.



This is the monarch's 'working crown' and is used on formal occasions e.g. the opening of parliament.



Queen Mary's crown

This is worn by the Queen Consort.

Ampulla and spoon

This is used for anointing the monarch with holy oil (see article on page 8)



St Edward's staff

This is carried in the coronation procession.

The three swords

The swords of mercy, spiritual justice and temporal justice. They symbolise royal powers and responsibilities.





The sword of offering, spurs and armills

These are given to the monarch after the anointing.

The spurs represent the values of protecting the weak and the church while the armills symbolise the bond the monarch has with their people and the values of sincerity and wisdom.

The Sceptre

The sceptre with a cross represents temporal and spiritual power while the sceptre with a dove symbolises the Holy Spirit.

The orb

The orb is symbolic of the globe and represents worldly and Christian power.



The sovereign's ring

This symbolises dignity, faith and the monarch's commitment to their people and the church.



Queen Consort's sceptre

This is an ivory rod topped with a dove symbolising equity and mercy.

The King's Coronation



This month we will have the privilege of watching the Coronation of His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen Consort on Saturday 6th May at Westminster Abbey. I am sure many of us will be glued to our televisions to watch this historical event unfold!

One important aspect of the coronation ceremony is when the monarch is anointed with oil — this was the one moment that was not televised during Queen

Elizabeth's coronation in 1953 as it was seen as religiously so important and transformative. This important oil is seen as holy, and used to consecrate and sanctify monarchs as sovereign and for the duties that are required of the role. The basis of this practice goes back to the Old Testament where initially this was used for priests, prophets and objects that would be placed in the tabernacle — the tent that the Israelites would congregate in.



The oil which will be used to anoint His Majesty, The King on 6th May 2023 has been consecrated in Jerusalem using olives from the Mount of Olives, pressed near Bethlehem and fragranced with essential oils of jasmine, cinnamon, orange blossom, benzoin, sesame, amber, neroli and rose for scent. The oil is then blessed so it becomes 'Chrism' oil. This oil will also be used to anoint Camilla as she is crowned as Queen Consort and it is based on the recipe used for Queen Elizabeth's coronation.

Normally, a batch of the oil is made to last for several coronations, but during the Second World War a bomb hit the deanery where it was being stored, so the late

Queen's coronation was the first to use the new batch, and so Charles has also opted for a fresh batch to be made. It is stored in this silver urn until the Coronation.

The Ampulla (centre) is an eagle shaped vessel used to pour out the anointing oil onto an ornate spoon to be used to consecrate the monarch during the coronation ceremony. (Getty Images)

In the Old Testament, oil often signified prosperity, blessings, and stability, opposed to other periods throughout Israel's history where the harvest was not bountiful and famine had swept the land (Joel 1:10).



The practice of anointing with oil transfers over to the New Testament. Jesus encourages His followers to anoint themselves with oil whenever they take up the practice of fasting (Matthew 6:17), and to pour oil on the sick as part of the healing process (Mark 6:13).

Significance of essential oils.

Jasmine oil has a long and colourful history. It has been known for a long time for its calming qualities. The Ancient Egyptians used it for headaches and to help improve sleep quality. The jasmine flower features in stories of ancient China, Persia and Egypt. It was revered by royalty in China and traded along the Silk Road.

Cinnamon oil is associated with a wide variety of benefits for health and wellness, including relaxing, soothing and cleansing.

Orange Blossom is used to reduce stress and anxiety. It cleanses the body by helping to eliminate toxins and strengthens the immune system. It drives away depression, stimulates the mind and daily motivation, helps to keep the body and in tune with the mind.

Benzoin essential oil is captured from the resin of gum Benjamin trees (native to Sumatra, Thailand and Java) and has been used medicinally for thousands of years. Benzoin incense was once believed to ward away 'troublesome spirits'.

Sesame oil boosts antioxidants which fight diseases, aids pain and promotes healthy sleep.

Amber oil is derived from amber, a fossilized resin of ancient trees. 'Amber' trees are extremely hard to find, making pure amber oil unique and expensive. The antioxidant properties found in amber oil can help improve cognition and prevent stress. It is also claimed to increase circulation, improve heart functions and the immune system.

Neroli oil is an essential oil produced from the blossom of the bitter orange tree. Its scent is sweet and honey-like, and somewhat metallic with green and spicy undertones. It's benefits include relieving pain, inflammation, depression, stress and insomnia. It can boost confidence, uplift mood, calm nervous tension, and promote a restful sleep.

Rose oil has many functions including decreasing anxiety and stress, reducing pain and antibacterial/ antifungal properties. Rose oil may stimulate the brain to release endorphins, often called the "feel-good" hormone.



The Archbishop of Canterbury, who will be conducting the Coronation Service, said

"Since beginning the planning for the Coronation, my desire has been for a new Coronation Oil to be produced using olive oil from the Mount of Olives. This demonstrates the deep historic link between the Coronation, the Bible and the Holy Land. From ancient kings through to the present day, monarchs have been anointed with oil from this sacred place. As we prepare to anoint The King and The Queen Consort, I pray that they would be guided and strengthened by the Holy Spirit."

Lord God, in your power you provide for your people and rule over them in love:

Grant to your servant Charles, our King the spirit of wisdom and government, that being devoted to you with his whole heart, he may so wisely govern, that during his reign your church may be protected, and Christian devotion may continue in peace; that so persevering in good works to the end, he may by your mercy enter your everlasting kingdom; through Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God now and for ever. **Amen.**


