RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioner,

FRONT OF CHURCH

In my Easter Vestry Address, which was published in the March Columban, I referred to the plans to reconfigure the front of St. Columba's to provide flexibility for our current needs. The Select Vestry and I have greatly valued all the positive and supportive comments during these past few months. We were very pleased that the plans, which were designed by Des Cairns, were recently approved by the Representative Church Body. Those plans which were first included in the March Columban are again included in this summer edition. The Select Vestry subsequently unanimously agreed to proceed this work which will commence at the beginning of July.

This work will involve:

- Replacing the front three nave pews with stackable chairs
- The fitting of a wooden floor in this open space identical to the wooden floor at the West End of the church
- Provision for wheelchair and rollator users in this new space
- The repairing of the damaged side aisle walls by water ingress from the old roof which will require the removal of plaster from those walls allowing them to dry out before they are replastered and painted.



This work will all be in keeping with the architecture of our beautiful church. It will provide many new opportunities for us to develop our traditional musical liturgical worship and our parish ministry. It is timely to undertake this work now as a single redecoration project of our church interior can then be planned in the coming months. Tenders are currently being received for this work.

The layout of the new chairs in front of the central pews will be realigned to face the side chapel Holy Communion table each Thursday to accommodate the congregation and also those parish organisations which now meet in the church.

This project is being funded by a generous legacy from Hazel Reid who was a *much respected and dedicated parishioner over many decades*. Hazel devoted her parish work to developing the Sunday School, the Choir, promoting Christian Aid

and Fair Trade. It is very fitting that her gift is being used to provide these new facilities for our growing parish.

To ensure continuity with the beautiful work which was done at the west end of the Church, the same architect and contractors who carried out that work have been appointed to undertake this project. In order for it to be completed at the earliest opportunity and to comply with health and safety regulations, it will be necessary for the church building to temporarily close while the work is being carried out. Throughout this time our church services will take place in the hall. The church will be deep cleaned before we return for an opening service of Dedication and Thanksgiving in September. This will mark a joyful commencement to our autumn activities with the immense benefits of the completion of all this work for this new season.

50 Year Anniversary of Ordination of Canon Laverty



On Thursday 29th June, parishioners at the Thursday morning Holy Communion service, along with the Rector, joined to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Ordination of Canon Walter Laverty.

He was brought up in St Mark's, Dundela as a child and his father was the first organist in Garnerville when it opened. Canon Laverty was ordained as one of four in Waringstown, on the 29th June (St Peter's Day) 1973, for the Diocese of Down and Dromore. He was initially curate of St Donard's Church, Bloomfield from 1973 – 1977, where Bill Arlow was his first Rector. Bill retired shortly after Walter arrived, so he served the rest of his first curacy under Pat Synott before moving to St Patrick's, Ballymacarrett in 1977 - 1982 for his second curacy.

It was in St Patrick's that he met Barbara, and they were married by Bishop GeorgeQuin (whoalsohad conducted the marriage of Barbara's parents many years before!). After a time in Upper and Lower Kilwarlin, he then moved to St John's, Orangefield in 1986 where he was Rector and Canon Precentor of Down Cathedral (Down & Dromore) until his retirement.



Many of us have experienced his warmth and natural humour, and his enthusiasm for meeting people as well as his deeply held Christian beliefs which he shares in a gentle and kind manner. He enjoys time spent chatting to everyone and loves to wander around in churches he has never been in before. We are extremely fortunate to have him assist with our services, home visits and many other aspects of parish life, and his wonderful and very supportive family are involved in many ways in St Columba's.

Sea Sunday 9th July 2023

The Mission to Seafarers was founded by John Ashley in 1856 to meet the spiritual needs of seafarers coming into the Port of Bristol. Gradually, under the auspices of the Anglican Church other Missions were opened in ports around the UK with the Belfast mission being opened in 1869. In addition to providing spiritual support, the Missions were seen as a place where seafarers could find a welcome, rest and safety.

This ethos has survived down the years with support services evolving to meet the changing needs throughout the world. The pandemic brought about radical changes in how support could be delivered and the great need was for mental as well as physical considerations to be met.

Belfast is very fortunate in having a well equipped centre near the port, easily accessible to seafarers who come to have a short period of relaxation away from the confines of their vessel. The Chaplain, Reverend Mark Reid, and a team of 'ship visitors' go into the port each day providing welcome, information and quite often practical help with urgent shopping, sourcing medical supplies or on occasion visiting a seafarer who may have been hospitalised for urgent treatment.

On Sea Sunday each year we remember in our thoughts and prayers, with thanks, the seafarers from many nations on whom we depend to transport the varied cargoes which we require for our material needs and which we all too often take for granted will be there when we need them.
