

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioner,

REOPENING OF ST. COLUMBA'S

There is great excitement across the parish as we prepare for the reopening of St. Columba's. It has been a busy few months for us as the much-anticipated refurbishment projects got under way. The contractors have been working extremely hard throughout the summer. While many sporting events were temporarily suspended during the summer due to adverse weather, the refurbishment project continued on as it was all internal work and was not affected by the rain!

The completion of all the work will provide a great start to our new season of parish activities. There will be new opportunities for us to embrace as we return to our beautiful church building refreshed for the busy months ahead.

The front three nave pews on each side have been removed and stackable chairs have been placed in that space which can be moved or completely removed as required for specific church services, concerts or visiting groups. This will give us much needed flexibility as St. Columba's seeks to serve you and the community more effectively. It will greatly assist us all by providing:

- Additional seating capacity in our Side chapel for our Thursday services
- Additional space for the Sunday School children in our services
- Additional space for cantors and singers at parish concerts
- Provision for wheelchair and rollator users to sit with their families
- Increased acoustics with the new wooden floor at the front of church
- Flexible seating for our parish organisations who meet in the church
- Facilities for school and historical groups for research projects

We are immensely grateful to Hazel Reid, whose generous bequest to our church which she served so faithfully throughout her life, has made all this much needed work possible.

It was good that we were also able to get the side aisle walls replastered together with plastering repairs throughout the building. The walls are now looking so much better with the completion of this long overdue work and are ready for painting later this year. The good news is that we can continue using the church while it is being painted.

In order for all this refurbishment work to reach its full potential, it needs <u>YOU</u> to join us for church services and parish activities. September is an ideal month to reconnect with St. Columba's - especially if you have not been able to join us for some considerable time. A very warm welcome awaits as we now start our new church season.

A service of Thanksgiving and Dedication will be planned following the internal painting of the church.

work. For me, and I suspect for many other people, the start of a new academic year in September is the time when I think about changes and planning for the months ahead.






Sea Sunday 9th July 2023

Note from the Treasurer

At the Easter General Vestry, I reported on our 2022 accounts. It was a broadly positive picture. We had completed a very significant project, replacement of the church roof, without incurring debt or unduly depleting our reserves. Significantly, we had weathered the discontinuities of the lockdowns and the extended closure of the church building. Both these achievements reflect the continuing generosity of our contributing members and the hard work of our Rector and clergy team. As with family life, the blessing of not having to worry unduly about money, allows us to focus on our core purpose.

Standing Orders - Time for a Change?

I feel it apt to mention the importance of standing orders to our finances. Almost 80% of regular giving is by standing order. This is a great benefit to the volunteer team who count and lodge cash and cheques. Their job is easier and safer. As we saw during lockdowns, standing order giving is resilient.

On the other hand, standing orders have the demerit of standing still whilst the financial climate changes around them. In an environment in which inflation is hovering around 10% per annum, and this becomes persistent, we could easily slide into a situation in which our income is not meeting our costs. All of our costs are increasing due to inflation, some such as heating and lighting by much more than 10%.

There is no obvious time to review a standing order. Those currently giving by standing order, might like to consider this note as an invitation to **review their giving**.

Those not currently using standing order giving may like to consider making a change.

Those who are not currently contributing might find that a small regular payment by standing order is an easy way to support our work.

The parish administrator would be more than happy to help you with these changes.

ORGAN SCHOLARSHIP MANAGEMENT BOARD

Touch rugby Q and A with Karen

Our Rectory family has shared some very exciting news!

Henry Auchmuty has been selected as male captain for the Ireland Mixed Open Touch Rugby Team for the European Championships to be held in



Vichy in France from 9th – 12th August. This is a wonderful achievement, and we congratulate Henry on his success!

Having attended "a few" rugby matches in my time and having spotted the Rector's family many times at Kingspan watching Ulster, I could not wait to catch up with Henry and ask him a few questions about his experiences with the team.

Here is what he had to say...

Q How did you become selected for this amazing opportunity?

A I have sustained a few shoulder injuries playing regular rugby and so decided to try touch rugby at university. As I am home for my placement year, I wanted to keep playing so I joined Belfast Warriors. It was here that I was asked to attend the Irish trials for the European Championship, and I was selected to play. I have been training 3 times per week in Dublin for the last 4 or 5 weeks, which has been a great experience.

Q How are you feeling as you look ahead to the championship matches?

A I am really looking forward to this opportunity. I have played with friends at university, and I am now looking forward to playing against them as they will be playing for England and Wales. I am really looking forward to this whole experience as it should be very enjoyable.

Q How does touch rugby feel different?

A A standard rugby team has 15 players on the pitch, where there are only 6 in touch rugby. This means that each player will have a lot more responsibility on the pitch. Fitness levels are greater, and there are less players to cover the pitch. Also, as there are no scrums or lineouts, there is less chance of running into one of the monster-sized front row players and therefore less chance of *injury. I still like to play rugby in the 15's team, but this is a completely different type of game, and I am really enjoying it.*

Q Why is touch rugby gaining so much attention at the moment?

A Coming from school's rugby, there is a lot more pressure from ages 13/14 to prepare and play like professionals. There are gym fitness levels and dietary plans to stick to, just as the professionals do. For some, this is not something they want to carry on with after school, and it is making people reconsider if this is something they want to do long term. For this reason, it



is putting off younger players from joining such a regimented schedule, leaving only the most dedicated continuing to play.

Touch rugby is a game of less contact, so children, adults, men and women can all play together. It comprises of two 20-minute halves with a 5-minute half time. A touch is legitimate and minimal contact between a player in possession of the ball and a defending player. A touch includes contact on the ball, hair or clothing and may be made by a defending player or by the player in possession. It is therefore perfect for any age group and can have the benefits of team interaction, fun and improve fitness levels without the restrictions of professional rugby and without the danger of head injuries etc.

Having watched these very lively seven matches against Switzerland, Italy, France, Netherlands, Guernsey, Wales and England, Henry displayed wonderful leadership and encouragement to the Ireland team, and the speed and dexterity of the players provided a completely different aspect to rugby. I am delighted to report that the Ireland team were placed fourth – an incredible achievement. Congratulations to Henry and the rest of the team.

On behalf of everyone at St Columba's we welcome Henry home and congratulate the Ireland team on their success in the European Championship matches!
