Dear Parishioner,

#### **EASTER HOPE**

#### Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Those are the words of the Easter greeting which we will be saying at the beginning of our services throughout this month. The message of Easter fills us with hope. This is good news which we need to hear just as it was for Mary and those disciples at the empty tomb on that first Easter morning. It made a real difference to them after all they had experienced at the foot of the cross. As Archbishop Desmond Tutu once wrote in a powerful and comprehensive Easter message:

We are Easter people who endeavour, with God's help, to demonstrate acts of kindness, support and generosity to those around us each day. May God give us the strength and focus to demonstrate a love for our neighbours, wherever they may be. I encourage us all to explore fresh ways to serve the risen Christ and one another.

This Easter as we see signs of hope and new life around us in our gardens and countryside, we give thanks for this opportunity of a fresh start in the way we live our own lives. May we therefore embrace the Easter Hope with enthusiasm by bringing light to situations of darkness and hope to those aspects of life which are difficult for us and those around us.

As we sing in this well know hymn:

"Lo, Jesus meets us, risen from the tomb;

Lovingly he greets us, scatters fear and gloom;"

May we be inspired and encouraged this Easter to live out the Good News that Christ is alive.

## Thought for the Month

#### **The Clumsy Runner**

In the loneliness of the long distance runner Alan Sillitoe said:

The thing with running is that sometimes you have good days and sometimes you have bad days, and the bad days are the ones where you fall over.

For those of you who are occasional runners like myself you will know that the joy of running mostly comes at the end when the run is over. It was in that vein that at 6am on November 16th I headed out on my 158th consecutive daily run, that day also happened to be my birthday. So filled with dreams of lots of cake and celebration, little did I know that I had a different surprise in store right at the end of my run. This would be a day where I would fall over...

At the end of my run, tired, hungry and ready for a birthday breakfast but with all the grace of a newborn giraffe on ice skates, I stumbled, tripped, and tumbled my way to a fall landing square on the cold hard concrete face first, proving once and for all that gravity has a wicked sense of humour. Happy birthday to me, indeed!

At the, as usual, sound advice of my wife, I arrived at the Ulster minor injuries clinic. Unfortunately it was at my insistence that we should head there immediately and that she should drop me off without my realising that this drop off was a full 40 minutes before minor injuries opened. With an increasingly swelling face and a not insignificant amount of pain flooding the right side of my head I could perhaps have been forgiven for not having the wit to read the opening hours of the unit as I proceeded to shake the door furiously convinced that I had been locked out. However, soon time passed and other injured parties arrived and informed me of the opening hours, handily placed in large red letters, next to the door I had been shaking.

A nurse saw me relatively quickly, I had a longer wait then for the consultant who after a quick x ray confirmed that I had broken my cheekbone and I was booked in for a CT scan given I had landed on my head. The CT scan confirmed the damage as a cheekbone broken in 3 places and an eye socket fractured in 2 places. I spoke with a surgeon who offered a correction involving plates and screws and notable risks, so I decided to forego the surgery and let the bones heal naturally. Over the next few days my face remained numb entirely on one side like I had been in the hands of a very determined dentist who had filled my cheek with more lidocaine than needed. The numbness made eating difficult but luckily my wife and my mother in law are experts in the culinary arts and so I was blessed with soups, cottage and shepherd's pies to sustain me whilst the healing process took hold.

As my face continued to heal and the numbness gradually subsided, Christmas rolled around, and with a cheekbone held together by very little, I ventured forth with my wife Lauren and sons Alex and Sam, on our planned holiday to Florida and Disney World where my face continued its recovery aided by the Florida sun over both Christmas and the New Year.

In conclusion, id like to thank the kind people who tended to me at the Ulster Hospital from the first nurse at the minor injuries through to the maxillofacial surgeon who saw me last. So if you ever find yourself hobbling through Disney World with a cheekbone held together by sheer force of will, just remember: every stumble is a step closer to your next great adventure.

This year, the entire season of Easter in the christian calendar falls in the month of April. The English word, 'Easter', is of uncertain origin. It is thought to be derived from the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring and fertility and was in use by the 7<sup>th</sup> Century. The festival celebrated by christians in the early centuries was called 'Pascha' which was associated with the Passover festival. Note that St. Paul wrote that 'Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us, therefore let us celebrate the feast.' In time, that became associated with the christian celebration of the resurrection of Christ. However, in much of the English speaking world, the name 'Easter' which has very limited faith significance, remains in common usage.

Some of the prayers acknowledge the fact that we are in the season of Easter. This month there is a varied selection of subjects, some of which recognise events that are of contemporary significance. Hopefully, you will find some of the contents helpful in your personal prayers and thoughts One writer states that to pray is to live. Some may agree with me that it is the sum of our relationship with God.

Supporting children in their formative years with reading skills will provide them with important skills for their lives. I recently had a most helpful meeting with the former Principal of Bloomfield Collegiate School, Dr. Darrin Barr who is the Equipping for Life Area Support Officer.

This is a wonderful opportunity to share skills and experiences with children to make a lasting difference to their lives. I will be inviting Dr. Barr to talk about his work with Equipping for Life in St. Columba's in the near future. The contact details for further information are provided in this very informative article.

#### **Equipping for Life**

We are a Belfast faith-based charity, established in 2018, and we seek to offer people of Christian faith volunteering opportunities to support children in local primary schools. We prioritise working in areas which have, and continue to experience, generational disadvantage. From humble beginnings, working with a few schools on the Shankill Road, we have grown to working with about 25 primary schools across Northern Ireland.



#### **Reading Programme**

A child's ability to read is the cornerstone of a successful and rewarding life and our volunteers are passionately committed to helping primaryaged children to improve this vital life skill. Equipping for Life is working in partnership with primary schools to place teams of volunteers who read to children on a regular basis. Our 130+ volunteers each have two



30-minute sessions per week with two different children. Each session opens with a prayer of blessing for the child followed by reading. The children come from P2 to P7 and the volunteers are encouraged to use a flexible approach to each session. In consultation with the schools, the volunteers may use other resources such as mini whiteboard or educational games to help build self-confidence and communication skills.

"Our pupils have benefitted greatly from the one-to-one reading experience they have had through EfL. The children have blossomed academically, socially and spiritually. They look forward very much to their weekly sessions with the devoted group of volunteers."

"One of my pupils came in mid-September at the start of his primary 3 year with just a handful of recognised words in his vocabulary. Praising, patience and pushing just 30 minutes a week saw him taken off the 'programme' a few months later because he no longer needed support. He was an independent reader!

What a joy this is for us as volunteers to know that small amounts of time can have such a big impact."
