

LENT

This year Ash Wednesday falls on the 14th February which marks the beginning of the penitential season of Lent. It's a timely opportunity for us all to creatively enable our faith to develop. As we move further into this new year with signs of spring growth all around, we need to ensure that our Christian faith has fresh opportunities to grow and strengthen. "Originally the word meant the lengthening of days, from the Old English lencten. I see it as the springtime of the heart. The growth in nature that we see needs to be reflected in our inner life, in our souls.... There is hope on the horizon and reasons to be hopeful."

May it be so for us each day.

Thursday Communion Service

The practice of holding a service of Holy Communion on Thursday mornings at 10.30am has been an integral part of weekly worship in our church for many years. Attendances have varied over the years with sometimes only 5 or 6 people present but in more recent times since the reopening of the church following the pandemic the numbers participating have steadily increased with an average weekly attendance of around 20 sometimes increasing to as many as 30 on occasion. The additional space now provided at the front of the Church has allowed for a more integrated congregation with everyone able to worship as a complete group, not separated between the chairs and pews as before.

Following the service coffee is provided at the West End allowing an opportunity for fellowship and chat. A little jug on the table provides an opportunity for donations and during the past year the total donations have amounted to £1000 which has been allocated to church funds. I would like to sincerely thank all those attending for their generosity in achieving this wonderful amount.

We look forward to the New Year and hopefully welcoming some new faces to our Thursday service.

Bible Study

If you call into the church on a Wednesday afternoon you hear much laughter from a group meeting to study the scriptures in a light-hearted manner. As clergy, we admit to having fun as we tackled more difficult books such as "Romans" and "Revelation". Everyone was amazed to learn how much the Bible speaks to today's society as in every age. Anyone who thinks the Bible is irelevant hasn't read it with any understanding.

This year we shall be reading through St Paul's letters to the Corinthians. They are among the most valuable letters for their presentation of the gospel as well as their vivid pictures of what any Christian community should be like. It has plenty to say to us as individuals.

We meet in the warmth of the choir vestry and enter via the choir door at the rear of the building close to the Rectory from 2.30-4.30pm with a quick cuppa at the back of the church before we leave. We are a small, but growing, group of 12 people; but would be delighted to welcome more to join us (including men-please). As we study the passages, we also cross-reference with other verses elsewhere in the Bible. Then we look at maps of the Holy Land and trace the footsteps of Jesus with his disciples. We also see the place names visited by Paul on his three missionary journeys. All of this helps us to understand the background scripture and its historical context.

Lent: A Practice of Prayer, Fasting, Giving & Preparation

During the holy season of Lent, we prepare ourselves for the spiritual events of Easter by fasting, praying and giving. However, this year is quite unusual!

Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Day) is on 13th February, when tradition allows us to use up food items and enjoy food before the fasting, which begins on Ash Wednesday, 14th February. However, St Valentine's Day also falls on Wednesday 14th, providing us with a bit of a quandary. Do we enjoy the Valentines Day sweet gifts we receive, or do we fast? Perhaps the answer lies somewhere in between. We know that Jesus fasted for 40 days and 40 nights in the desert before he faced his crucifixion, as he mentally prepared to make the ultimate sacrifice. Do we need to fast? What is the most important aspect of Lent?

Many things have changed in recent years, including how we do things and how we interact. The Covid years have challenged us and made us think of new ways of doing things, especially as we could not worship together in church. We were able to join our church services via the internet and were still able to pray in our homes. We could still eat or fast, whichever we decided.

However, now this time of preparation, of praying together, attending church together, and joining together to help our local community is constant in our lives again. God didn't go away and leave us. **Instead, He made us stronger as we all 'dug deep' to find ways through the lockdowns and traumas we faced.**

Attending church can provide a comfort which we missed during the Covid years. It is the coming together in worship and prayer which provides us with stability for the future, safe in the knowledge that we have both God and our church family with us.

How you decide to spend Lent, fasting or not, make sure that you spend time with God. Come and join in the many church services offered. Give generously with your heart to charity. But most importantly, make time to pray – this is *YOUR TIME* to make a difference, to give thanks for His blessings, to ask for assistance in the lives of those we love and to make a better connection with God.

Lent gives us the perfect opportunity to attend church and pray together. Come and join us!

PARISH FINANCES - A YEAR END CHECKLIST

As we approach the end of another year, the Select Vestry would like to take this opportunity to thank parishioners sincerely for their continued financial support throughout 2023. Without that support, St Columba's would not be able to flourish, to grow or to be the beacon that it is across the Parish and beyond. As the year now draws to a close, there are a number of points you may wish to check:

I have donated all my intended 2023 contributions before Sunday 31st December 2023. Parishioners are reminded that any financial contributions for the 2023 year <u>must</u> be received by Sunday 31st December 2023. Any contributions received after that date will be allocated to the 2024 year.

If I am a UK taxpayer I have completed a Gift Aid form. Any UK taxpayers who have not already completed a Gift Aid form are reminded to do so. Gift Aiding means that the Parish can claim up to a further 25% of the value of contributions at no additional cost to the parishioner.

I contribute to Parish funds by Standing Order. The Select Vestry is very grateful for all financial contributions regardless of how those are made and is mindful of personal preference regarding the means of contributing. Nonetheless, the majority of parishioners now contribute to Parish funds by Standing Order. This is the preferred method for regular giving as it is secure, cost effective and attracts lower bank charges than cash or cheque equivalents.

Loose Plate Allocations

In February, we contributed £977.45 to the Turkey/Syria Earthquake Appeal from loose plate collections, and The Royal British Legion received £393 from the loose plate collection at our Remembrance Day services.

We allocated the loose plate collection from the Carol Service to the Dean's Sit Out at St Anne's Cathedral, which received £1453.80. The loose plate collection from our Advent Carol Service was allocated to the NI Children's Hospice, which received £308.

Our Holy Week services loose plate collections raised £754.90 for Marie Curie.

Finally, a further significant contribution will be made to Marie Curie once the final sum for mission and charity giving in 2023 has been calculated. All of these contributions make an immense difference to peoples' lives, and we know the charities are most grateful for this financial support. Prayers for your thoughts and comfort



Every year in religious and other circles, questions are asked about the date of Easter. That date affects the time when we observe Holy Week and Pentecost. Occasionally, articles are written suggesting reasons for making Easter a fixed date in the calendar. Historically, it is easier to justify the calendar date of Easter than it is to argue the case for the observation of Christmas on 25th. December. However, that would require a lengthy article in the Columban which is not the purpose of the section on 'Thoughts and Prayers' each month. Sufficient to say that Easter will be earlier than usual this year which means that we will observe Ash Wednesday in February. A prayer recognises that fact in this issue while reserving some Lent related topics until March.

In the ancient Celtic world, the start of the season Im bole and St. Brigid's Day - I st. February - marked the dawning of a new age, including the beginning of new growth.

Whatever our views on the above topics may be, it is hoped that you will find some helpful material and prayers in this section of the Columban.

St. Brigid's Day 1st February

St. Brigid is one of the three national saints of Ireland along with St. Patrick and St. Columba. She was the founder of an early 6th.Century monastery at Kildare near the present day cathedral which bears her name. The St. Brigid's Cross is distinctive and unusual. Her name is associated also with Bride. As many as 40 townlands and parishes bear her name. For example, the word 'Kilbride' means the Church of Bride or Brigid. It is possible that Knockbreda means the 'hill of Bride or Brigid.

Prayer

Father, we rejoice today in the fellowship of your servant Brigid, who strengthened your Church in this land. Help us to follow the example of her life of work and loving service to our Saviour, Jesus Christ. **Amen**

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple 2nd February

This marks the occasion when the parents of Jesus brought him to the Temple, forty days after his birth. The account includes the Song of Simeon known as the 'Nunc Dimittis'. Read St. Luke 2. The day is known also as Candlemas, when candles are sometimes carried in procession, commemorating the words of Simeon, describing Christ as 'a light to lighten the Gentiles.'

Prayer

Almighty God, who fulfilled the hopes of Simeon and Anna who welcome the Messiah to the Temple. Complete in us your will that, in Christ we may see your salvation, for he is the Lord for ever. **Amen.**

Ash Wednesday February 14th

Romantics may associate this date with the mythical figure Valentine, but the date this year, marks the beginning of Lent. The season will last until Easter at the end of March but more about that fact, next month. Ash Wednesday drives its name from the placing of repentant ashes on the foreheads of participants. Ashes were used in Biblical times to denote grief. Read St. Matthew 11 v.21 and St. Like 10 v. 13. You will find suggested readings for this day on Page 34, Book of Common Prayer.

Prayer

Almighty God, who hates nothing that you have made, and forgives the sins of all who are penitent. Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our weaknesses, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Prayer for a faithful observance of Lent

Please note:- Mid week services in St. Columba's on Wednesday evenings Almighty God, you invite us to enter deeper into your world. Enable us to do so this Lent. May it be a time of outward focus, seeking you in those we have ignored. Help us also to live a Lent of discipline, reflection, generosity and encounter, so that we may have the rock solid assurance of your unwavering faith in us, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

Men's Forum

Yes, you have read it correctly. What was formerly known as the Men's Club is now replaced by the Men's Forum. Why the change you may ask? The change has been brought about after many hours of debate and discussions over the past few years. Leading up to the pandemic we had, even then, been considering the Men's Club future and what direction we saw it going. We were in the throes of arranging events to celebrate 60 years of the Men's Club. Sadly, that never happened thanks to the pandemic.

So where are we today? We are now kicking off 2024 with the formation of a new venture catering for the male members of our church. This is not simply to be a rebranding of a bowling club but an opportunity to reintroduce and further strengthen the original ethos of what was originally called the St Columbas Parish Men's Club when founded in 1959. It was created in response to views of the then growing church family of St Columba's. A dedicated group of men formed a club that allowed male members to meet, enjoy fellowship, socialise and experience a sense of belonging. During its tenure it created and strengthened friendships both in and outside the church. They held various functions from treasure hunts to barn dances, outings, debates, talks, facilitated local drama groups to put on plays in the church hall, assisted other organisations in the church when help was needed. Such was the ethos and drive of those early founders. In its heyday the bowling aspect (one of the items introduced for members) had taken over and such was the impact that when I joined St Columbas over 40 years ago, I still have a vivid memory of stepping inside the church hall for the first time to join the parish Men's Club, to be greeted with a throng of men bowling on 5 mats stretching the full width of our hall! Membership then numbered over 50 men. Sadly, those days are long gone. We suffered like many other clubs. Memberships dropped and clubs folded. Yet we still managed to hold the club together despite very poor numbers.

The work now begins. Initially we are meeting each Monday evening at 7.30 in the church hall. We aim to provide through time a varied programme offering a wide range of topics and events. A place to call in, have a chat with members, create friendships, share stories and enjoy company and refreshments. For this to work we need you, the men of the congregation, to assist us to achieve our aim by coming along any Monday evening and engage with us. We want to hear your views and ideas. You will be assured of a very warm welcome.

Thought for the Month

A REMARKABLE COINCIDENCE OR DIVINE INTERVENTION?

Earlier this year I visited Edinburgh for one of my periodic reunions with my old university friend Malcolm, who was back home visiting from Australia, where he

now lives. When we meet up, we often reminisce about a remarkable moment when we discovered, by chance, that my father

and his uncle Colin Anderson had served together in the army and, inspired by (but unknown to) my dad, Colin had since been ordained in the Church of Scotland and pursued a career in the ministry.

We became aware of this wonderful coincidence one day when I was at Malcolm's parents' house for Sunday lunch, and Colin and his wife Helen were there too. Colin, as a Church of Scotland minister was naturally inquisitive about my dad, a minister in the Church of Ireland. He remarked that he had once known a Church of Ireland padre called Moore during his time in the

army. Quickly it transpired that this was none other than my dad, Jim Moore! In the early 1960s, my dad was serving as a chaplain to the Parachute Regiment, which coincided with Colin's time in National Service, also in the Paras, and both were posted to Cyprus as part of 2 Para. I now discovered that, not only had both men served together, but they had been good friends, and Colin was a regular worshipper at dad's services. They did not, however, keep in touch after leaving the army, and so my dad was unaware that, influenced by his time

with him, Colin had later put himself forward for ordination. As well as parish ministry, he had served as industrial chaplain on Clydeside and now as Glasgow University chaplain.

Both men were amazed and delighted to be put back in touch with each other, at first by phone



and letter, and soon to be reunited in person, when my mum and dad met up with Colin and his wife Helen, alongside Malcolm's parents, on a holiday to Scotland.

What were the chances that, thirty or so years after that time in Cyprus, one man's son and the other man's nephew would both choose to go to university in Edinburgh, to study for the same degree; that the two would become friends; and through that friendship, Colin and my dad would themselves be reunited discovering that the two now shared a vocation in the Church?

THE REGISTER OF VESTRY MEMBERS

During this month, the Register of Vestry members is open for review and is available for inspection from the Churchwardens. This register is separate from the parish database and only those whose names appear on it are eligible (subject to their consent at the Annual Vestry Meeting) for nomination and election to the Select Vestry. In addition, those parishioners are entitled to vote at the elections during the Annual Easter Vestry meeting.

If your name is not already on the Register of Vestry Members and you wish to have it added, you are required to:

- Be over 18 years of age
- Be a contributor to church funds in a recognised form (Free Will Offering envelopes or Standing Order). Please contact the Parish Administrator, Karen Patterson (028 9065 6891) if you wish to support the work of St Columba's in this way.
- Sign a Form of Declaration, which can be obtained from the Churchwardens - please contact them directly. These completed forms need to be returned to them by Sunday 25th February 2024.
- Should a parishioner's financial contribution to the parish have lapsed for a period of 12 months or more, their name may be removed from the Register of Vestry Members in agreement with the Select Vestry Review Meeting which will take place on Tuesday 27th February at 7.30pm.
- It is the responsibility of parishioners to ensure that they are fully compliant with these requirements before the review meeting on Tuesday 27th February. If in doubt, please contact the Parish Administrator, Karen Patterson on (028 9065 6891 Monday to Friday 9am-1pm) or by email: office.knock@down.anglican.org for more information.

St Columba's, along with other parishes, is now registered as an individual charity with the Charity Commission (N.I.). As a recent communication form the Diocesan Office stated,

"Each member of the Select Vestry is considered as a Trustee of their parish – that is nothing new in terms of their responsibilities, it is just that these have been formalised under charity legislation".

The Supplementary Guidance on Charity Trustees provides this additional information for your assistance:

Anyone who is elected as a member of a Select Vestry must not be disqualified from being a trustee of a charity. Those disqualified under the Charities Act from acting as a trustee are anyone who:

- Has been convicted of an offence involving deception or dishonesty, unless the conviction is a spent conviction under the Rehabilitation of Offenders (NI) Order 1978.
- Is an undischarged bankrupt or has made a voluntary arrangement with creditors
- Has previously been removed as a trustee by the Commission or by the Court
- Is subject to disqualification under company legislation.

It is the responsibility of anyone who might fall into any of these categories, not to make themselves available for election to the Select Vestry.
