

# Thought for the Month

We are surrounded by phrases and motivational quotes made famous over the years reminding us of the ups and downs of life and how we should be navigating these but one surely resonates with us all, 'Life is a

rollercoaster.' Regardless of class, status or wealth, everyone faces times of great joy, sadness, anxiety and too often trauma. Throughout big events in life whether happy or sad, I have been blessed with a wonderful husband, children and wider family with whom I've walked through them.

Whilst I am not someone who turns to phrases or quotes to make it through the day there are two that I keep close and have helped me to move forward particularly at difficult times. The first I heard on that dreadful day, 8 November 1987, after the 'Enniskillen Bomb.' Like so many, I remember the day in detail. My two sisters, both trained nurses at home enjoying a rest day, went to the Erne Hospital immediately we heard the news as an urgent call was sent out from anyone with medical training to attend. The telephone rang all day with a constant drip of names of the dead & injured. The sense of disbelief

increased as the day unfolded and then a call which told us, 'Marie Wilson isn't going to make it!'

Marie was only a few years older than me training to be a nurse in The Royal Victoria Hospital. She had also been Deputy Head girl in The Collegiate Grammar School where I was a pupil. Marie was known to be a very kind, calm, respectful young girl who was always there to support. I remember a moment in school when I was on the receiving end of a very severe dressing down by a rather scary teacher in front of a large audience of pupils across year groups. My crime was not being where I was supposed to be when I was supposed to be, which did happen from time to time! Marie came behind me very quietly and whispered, 'Don't worry, I'll help you to sort this.' I have never forgotten that kindness. I could not fathom or grasp how a young girl of such character and who surely would have followed a path of good could have her life cut short in this way.

Marie's father, Gordon Wilson, spoke very bravely about what had happened. He said, 'It's part of a greater plan, and God is good.' At that time those words struck me, 'It's all part of God's plan.'There was no sense to what happened but we had to believe that there was a reason for the greater good, otherwise how could people keep going. In 1987 those words were a crutch. Since then as my faith has grown and deepened when life has thrown challenges my way just saying those words aloud has helped me to feel God's presence and to move forward. Whether the challenge is small or large believing and trusting that it is all part of God's plan has been a mainstay of my life.

Today's world is a hectic one in which we move at pace. Mindfulness is very much promoted as a way to seek balance. The second phrase which resonates with me is one repeated to me often as a young mum many years before the word mindfulness became fashionable. My husband's grandma was a lady of deep faith and much loved by everyone. I was always on the move, planning the next thing and she would often stop me in my tracks and repeat, 'This too shall pass.' What a great reminder to be present. In good times and in bad this has served me well. I have repeated this to myself when sitting outside an interview room feeling tongue tied through nerves, when watching a dearly loved family member dealing with illness and also through some wonderful family occasions, in particular our son's wedding. It has helped me to steer through the difficulties and to savour the good times.

As a teacher I am sometimes asked what I wish for my children's futures. I wish them to be happy and fulfilled in whatever path they choose. I hope that like me, they will see that God has a plan for them and gain strength from that knowledge and finally remember whatever the event, it will pass.



# **A Global Mission to Seafarers**

When the Reverend John Ashley looked out at the ships on the Bristol Channel in 1856 and felt God's call to minister to the seafarers, I wonder if he thought that what is now called the Mission to Seafarers would be a global mission of care to all seafarers. That includes such ports as Vancouver, British Columbia on Canada's west coast where I am the Senior Port Chaplain some 4586 miles from Belfast.

The Port of Vancouver is not what brings most people to the city. However, by tonnage it is the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest port in North America with ships coming and going around the world especially from Asia. The seafarers make the movement of goods, which in Canada's case includes a lot of exports such as grain and potash, possible.

In Vancouver there is a team of Chaplains from the Anglican (Mission to Seafarers),Roman Catholic and Christian Reformed traditions with 2 Seafarer Centres in the Port one a large single-story trailer and the other a heritage building known as the big blue house. The centres are a sanctuary a 'home away from home' where seafarers come to get information about Vancouver, to relax, to use the Wi-Fi to communicate with loved ones and to talk to someone who is willing to listen and is not a fellow crew member. Seafarers appreciate greatly the transportation provided to the centres and local shops and attractions. Ship turnaround time and seafarer duties means that worship including blessings take place onboard and ship visits remain a priority.



We run a program to support the most vulnerable onboard often the messman in the galley. A highlight of the year is the delivery of Christmas gifts called 'Christmas at Sea'. Chaplains around the world work together under the banner of the International Christian Maritime Association (ICMA) to care for seafarers. One tool we use is an app that enables us to record and share information especially incidents onboard and statistics about the



crew and another being joint training where we connect and share ideas.

Collaborating in ministry enhances our services to seafarers which would not be possible without the dedicated support of others including parishes like St Columba's. I consider it a privilege to be able, because of the efforts of others, to make it known to seafarers that we care, to express our collective gratitude and to hear and see their joy and appreciation.

May God continue to direct our hearts and minds in response to those who provide such an essential service, who live with perils on the sea who come to our shores be it Vancouver or Belfast or wherever the water ways of the earth take them

# A SCOUTING CHALLENGE

Part of Baden Powell's skill when he envisaged 'Scouting for boys' was to provide challenges for boys that tested them and enhanced their abilities as individuals and as team members. Learning with the help and guidance of others is critical in overcoming any challenge and so with the help of St Columba's parishioners, scouts have overcome the challenge of relocation from Knock Presbyterian to the Church Hall this summer.

Our migration along the Kings Road occurred after a successful and thankfully dry camp at Kilcully in County Cork. Three patrols of scouts supported by 6 adult leaders travelled by minibus to just north of Cork City for our summer



sojourn under canvas.

Our scouts camp in patrols led by a senior scout as patrol leader who has primary responsibility for the guidance of his scouts in food prep, cooking and remarkably for teenagers, cleaning up afterwards. Maintenance of kitchens, fire area, tentage, personal kit and hygiene is ruthlessly marked as part of the camp competition challenge by the leaders who supervise and enjoy the meals prepared over open fires.

However, camp is not just about keeping a tidy tent. We enjoyed a fishing trip around Bantry Bay observing seals, crabs and lobsters and even a dolphin came to visit our boat. A day at Ballyhass adventure centre with archery, high net trampolines, team challenges and inflatable aqua park was a real highlight as was the cliff walk at Ballycotton where slightly colder sea water took our breath away.

Friendships were made with neighbouring campers on our site from County Roscommon with competitive games of rounders and an exchange of badges and scout 'neckers' (scarves). Our fellow scouts from Scouting Ireland were wholly impressed with the traditional scouting skills displayed by our scouts and the challenge of self sufficiency with minimal leader supervision is rewarded when a healthy dish of chicken korma is prepared, cooked over a wood fire by a 12 year old and is not only edible, but actually delicious.

The camping experience suggested by Baden Powell permits boys of different skills and backgrounds to be part of something timeless and special and creating memories of a lifetime. Whether it's a song, a joke, a story round the campfire or a home run against the Roscommon scouts they all bring something to the

camp that creates an immeasurable togetherness for scouts and leaders too.

Our return from camp was followed by the quite considerable logistical move of our scouting equipment from the Scout Hall at the Presbyterian Church to St Columba's. I am sad to leave the scout hall with its familiar smells and character having been there as a troop since 1964. For me personally having started as

a cub scout in the 1970s it holds many happy memories and I trust for all those who passed through the scout hall doors to learn of 'trust, loyalty, friendship, courage, self respect and respect for others'.

Seven van loads of equipment was transferred to the downstairs halls at St Columba's by a party of scouts working like ants to make ready our new meeting den. We are indebted to the Parish for permitting us to use your accommodation and particularly for the warm and helpful welcome we have received.

The troop currently stands as 63 boys strong with a cohort of cubs to move up to the troop at Christmas. Our mantra has always been similar to that of Canon Auchmuty as "All welcome" and our consistent strength comes from never turning away any boy who wishes to give scouts a try. There have been several boys from the parish who have in the past and some currently enjoying scouts, including the Rector's son Charles who is embedded as one of the leader team.





Whether as an adult volunteer, whether as a young person undertaking Duke of Edinburgh or as a boy wanting to meet the challenges in scouts you will be most welcome. We are aware not everyone does or likes the camping bit and not everyone feels they have the skills of what they perceive as essential scouting talents from their youth and thus are reluctant to come forward but volunteering to help a scout's mental wellbeing and creating new friendships is a challenge BP made to adults on formation of the world's largest youth organisation. That's a great challenge to us all.



# GLORIOUS CHARGE or MILITARY BLUNDER? (Part 1)

Half a league, half a league, Half a league onward, All in the valley of Death Rode the six hundred. "Forward the Light brigade! Charge for the guns!" he said; Into the valley of Death Rode the six hundred.

Stirring lines from the first verse of Alfred, Lord Tennyson's epic poem, *The Charge of the Light Brigade*, with which most of us have probably been familiar

since childhood....and yet, are we aware of what actually happened on that fateful morning of 25<sup>th</sup> October 1854, during the Battle of Balaclava in the Crimean War? Moranne and I, along with our friends, fellow parishioners, Freda and Rodney McDonald, had the privilege of visiting the site of the famous charge during a Black Sea cruise in October 2013, six months before the Crimean Peninsula was annexed by Russia and closed thereafter to tourists.



The Crimean War lasted from 1853 until 1856 and was a joint military attempt by the Ottoman, French and British forces, supported by Austria and Sardinia, to stem the

southward expansion of the Russian Empire towards the Black Sea, the latter having already advanced into the Turkish controlled territories of Moldavia and Wallachia (modern day Romania). Britain was keen to maintain access to the Black Sea via the Dardenelles for trading purposes with Turkey, whilst both France and Russia had had separate disputes over the rights of Christians in Palestine which was controlled by the Ottoman Empire at the time. The French resolved their differences with Turkey but Napolean III of France continued to head butt with Nicholas I of Russia as the European empires jostled with each other at the extremities of their territories. However, Britain was the junior partner in the Allied triumvirate, supplying some 98,000 troops compared to France's 310,000 and Turkey's 236,000. The Russian forces amounted in total to around 889,000 men.

The Allied objective was to capture the port and fortress of Sevastopol, Russia's principal naval base on the Black Sea, on the western coast of the Chersonese Peninsula, Crimea. Men, horses and supplies were shipped from Europe to Varna on the eastern coast of Bulgaria, thence onwards to a point on the Chersonese

Peninsula north of Sevastopol, before marching southwards to encircle the Russian naval base from all sides. The British chose to supply their troops through the small southern port of Balaclava; and an opening inconclusive battle took place on the river Alma as the Russians attempted to break out of Sevastopol, leading to their decision to drive a wedge through the British supply lines between Sevastopol and Balaclava. Whilst the senior British military commander, Lord Raglan, who had last seen action at the Battle of Waterloo some forty years previously, enjoyed cordial relations with his French counterpart, General Canrobert, the same

could not be said of Lord Lucan, overall commander of the cavalry including both the Heavy and Light Brigades, and his brother-in-law, Lord Cardigan, who commanded the Light Brigade. The two men detested each other intensely. The British defences around Balaclava were mainly positioned in the South Valley, separated from the North Valley by the Causeway Heights, both valleys

running in parallel west to east and lying north of the port. The 93<sup>rd</sup> Highland infantry under Sir Colin Campbell was lined up in the South Valley whilst British naval guns from the battleship HMS Diamond, manned mainly by Turks, were positioned on the southern side of the Causeway Heights. The Heavy and Light Brigades were stationed at the western end of the North Valley, and the main Russian field artillery, some 50 guns, plus infantry, were ranged about two kilometres away on both sides of, and at the eastern end, of the North Valley.

At 6.00 am on the morning of October 25<sup>th</sup>, Russian infantry and artillery launched a surprise attack on the British naval guns dug into in their earthen redoubts on the southern slopes of the Causeway Heights, eventually gaining the upper hand and by 9.00 am started to drag them away. At the same time a large force of Russian cavalry charged at the 550 men of the 93<sup>rd</sup> Highland infantry, formed up in the famous 'thin red line', but was successfully repulsed. The Heavy Brigade pursued the disarrayed Russian cavalry to the eastern end of the North Valley but failed to fully press home their advantage. Meantime, the Light Brigade under Lord Cardigan took no part in the action, much to Lord Lucan's fury, leading to a bitter exchange between the two commanders.

From his command vantage point on the Sapoune Heights to the west of the two valleys, Lord Raglan could survey the entire battlefield and particularly the Russians' attempt to drag away the British naval guns. He immediately despatched an order to Lord Lucan and his two cavalry brigades to urgently intervene – it was considered bad form militarily to lose vital guns to the enemy. Lord Lucan, however, from his much lower position in the North Valley, had no view of what was happening to the British guns on the Causeway Heights;

moreover, Raglan promised Lucan the support of additional infantry which did not materialise – in fact, it was still at Sevastopol, a two hour march away. The only guns that Lucan was aware of were those of the Russian batteries surrounding the other end of the North Valley. It was absolutely against all accepted military practice of the day for cavalry to charge headlong into the full fire power of field artillery. Perplexed by the order, Lucan didn't move.

Three more similarly ambiguous orders followed from Raglan, each more frantic than the previous one. The fourth order was accompanied in person by an aid-de-camp, Captain Nolan, who confronted Lucan and Cardigan, urging them to attack the guns at once, with a broad (and ambiguous) wave of his arm. Again, the only guns that Lucan and Cardigan could see were those at the eastern end of the North Valley. Stung into action by the young captain, Lucan ordered Cardigan to advance with the Light Brigade towards the Russian guns, both men fully aware that such a manoeuvre was, and could only be seen as,

utterly suicidal. This time, the Heavy Brigade did not support the Light Brigade and remained in place as spectators of the unfolding events.

With Cardigan leading from the front and slightly contrary to Tennyson's poem, some 670 men set off on their horses in three closely serried ranks down the valley (around 200 were absent due to sickness), trotting most of the way until finally able to reach a full gallop and charge. However, they were guickly caught up in an enfilade of infantry and artillery fire from both sides of the North Valley before even coming within range of the enemy guns at the eastern end, and Nolan was killed within minutes. The Russian gunners could not believe their eyes at the sight of the Light Brigade riding steadily towards them for well over a mile, providing perfect targets, and they assumed that the British Hussars, Light Dragoons and Lancers could only have been intoxicated. Somehow, however, despite the smoke, thunder and din of exploding shells, the chaos and mayhem of dying and wounded troopers and charging horses, the Light Brigade managed to reach the Russian guns at the far end of the valley and overrun them, only to find themselves suddenly confronted by some 2000 Russian cavalry who had regrouped after their rout earlier that morning, and were now in no mood for compromise.....it was a bridge too far....
