Thought for the Month

'A Grandmother who enjoyed the good of her Labour'

I caught a piece on the news recently about an amazing lady called Ethel from Surrey who had celebrated her 115th birthday. She

confided that her secret to a long and happy life was: "Never argue with anyone. I listen and then I do what I like!

I just love that kind of

approach! It reminded me of my maternal grandmother, Agnes Reid, who came from rural County Antrim and was a traditional 'Irish Mammy.' She was kind, strong, hardworking, generous, ambitious and always made her church Rector some tea, buttered fruit loaf and cake

each time he came to visit. Ministers were held in very high esteem.

Just after the Second World War when rationing was still in place she often saved oranges for her minister at St Andrew's, Rasharkin (near Ballymena). Now that doesn't sound terribly generous, but just after WW 2, oranges were a scare commodity and for a young, new to the job, minister and his wife, oranges were 'manna from heaven'.

My grandmother would have loved to have studied to become a teacher, but being one of nine children and money being scarce, going to college to gain a teaching diploma was not an option.

Her father, who was to go on to play his part in the Northern Ireland Labour party and trade union movement, did make sure she went to a technical college where she learned secretarial skills and book-keeping. She went on to work for local businesses in Ballymoney until she got married in 1930. At that time when women tied the knot, they had to give up work, so her focus was on bringing up eight children as well as running little side businesses. I suppose today we'd say she was an entrepreneur working from home, but nobody really thought of it as

a job back then. She sold eggs produced by the chickens they kept on their small holding and marketed clothing from fashion catalogues to local families in the surrounding countryside.

During election times when the local Ulster Unionist party representatives came to give her a lift to the polling stations, she listened and never argued.



However, once in the polling booth her vote immediately went to the Northern Ireland Labour Party, in keeping with her Labour roots.

And the Ulster Unionists never knew a thing!

SCOUTS

As we prepared to move into our new scout den in the Parochial Halls there was some heavy lifting required with the transfer of our equipment from Knock Presbyterian to St Columba's. Transferring decades of kit acquired by my scouting predecessors and in truth myself was no small task.

I wish I could I have been more ruthless with a cathartic clear out of tired, older and perhaps the odd rusty item but our scout mentality of 'mend and make do' teaches us that there is value in looking after what we have

I often reference the fact that one of the patrol tents we take each year to summer camp was first used by the troop in the 1960s. Embedded as one of our 7 scout laws is "A scout makes good use of his time and is careful of possessions and property." Hence nearly every item of equipment from our former scout hall now rests at 29 Kings Road

By involving scouts in the movement of tents and mallets and patrol boxes and ropes and poles and maps and compasses and the sports equipment, our aspiration is they will take a degree of pride in the premises and their own gear having got a sweat up lugging our resources down the stairs.

It is said a volunteer is worth 10 pressed men. The scouts who volunteered to move kit from Knock Presbyterian may well have been motivated by the promise of a trip to Al Gelato in Ballyhackamore, but it was a well deserved treat and a decent reward for their efforts.

NEW BEGINNINGS



A church has stood on the site of Canterbury Cathedral since 597AD when Augustine was sent by Pope Gregory the Great to reintroduce Christianity to England. The Cathedral was then completely rebuilt between 1070 and 1077 by Archbishop Lanfranc.

The Cathedral is perhaps most famous for the murder of the archbishop, Thomas Becket, in the north-west transept in 1170, by knights of King Henry II. It is said that the King was in frequent conflict with Becket, exclaiming once: 'Will no one rid me of this turbulent priest?'. Four of his knights took this literally, and murdered Becket in his own cathedral. Every year, there is a memorial service on

the 29th of December for the Martyrdom of St Thomas. The liturgy includes lines from TS Eliot's *Murder in The Cathedral* and a dramatic slamming of the cathedral door. Although, it does mean that I have to stay in Canterbury until after this service is over, every year.

On the 8th of September, I was installed as a Lay Clerk in the cathedral choir, after spending a year here as a Choral Scholar. A Lay Clerk is a professional adult singer, who traditionally makes up the back row of a cathedral choir. They sing the lower three parts in the choir, and children sing the top line. I feel immensely privileged to be a part of the choir of Canterbury Cathedral; to play a small part in a musical tradition that spans over 1400 years. Working in a building as historic as this, it is hard not to acknowledge the importance of tradition. Yet, whilst tradition is so significant, and should be cherished, it is also acknowledged that in the present day, many things need to be modernised. The Cathedral Choir changed 10 years ago, with the formation of a girls choir, who initially sang one service per week, but now sing three services, equal in number to the boys choir. Additionally, I am very proud to have been installed as the first female lay clerk of Canterbury Cathedral.

Here's to many more! The role of 'lay clerk' at Canterbury is one which has existed for hundreds of years, and my predecessors include the composer Thomas Tallis... so no pressure!

I would not be doing what I am doing now if it weren't for the guidance and support of St Columba's musicians, clergy, and parishioners, and indeed the music staff at Methody. I am very fortunate to have been surrounded



by such brilliant musicians from a young age, and feel very grateful to have been given the opportunity to develop my singing in the welcoming and supportive atmosphere of St Columba's.

Alongside being a lay clerk, I work for The Friends of Canterbury Cathedral, where I am the Database Administrator and Membership Manager. The Friends is a network of 5000 people, spanning the globe, and is referred to as the 'cathedral's fan club', as through fundraising and events, we raise money to give grants to support all aspects of cathedral life. This role allows me to combine my love of maths with my passion for singing.

GLORIOUS CHARGE or MILITARY BLUNDER?

(Part 2)

The Light Brigade now faced total annihilation. The only desperate option was to attempt to withdraw back up the North Valley, to their start point. But they were quickly encircled on both sides by Russian infantry and artillery, as well as behind from the very guns they had just overrun, as the Russian gunners regrouped and opened fire once again, this time on the backs of the retreating British. Furious and frantic fighting ensued but, miraculously, the remnants of the Brigade somehow manage to extricate themselves from the closing Russian trap and struggle back up the North Valley to safety. The charge had started at around 11.15 am and was over within forty minutes – as was the effectiveness of the Light Brigade as a fighting force for the rest of the Crimean War.

To this day, historians debate the errors leading up to, and during, the charge itself (as well as throughout the entire Crimean campaign) and how things might have turned out differently if there had been clearer communications, better field intelligence and more decisive military leadership. Perhaps the most incredible outcome, however, was the scale of the casualties suffered by the Light Brigade. Considering the utterly suicidal nature of the frontal charge, and the miraculous escape when surrounded on all sides by the Russians, out of the 670 officers and men, 110 were killed and 160 wounded or taken prisoner, an attrition rate of some 40% - compared to casualty rates of up

to 90% in many regiments during the First World War 60 years later. No less than 400 troopers survived the charge and staggered back to tell the tale, although many of them would undoubtedly go on to suffer severe PTSD for the remainder of their lives, a completely unrecognised condition at the time. However, over half of their horses were also killed or had to be destroyed, and in hostile territory so far from home were virtually impossible to replace, resulting in the Light Brigade's minimal contribution for the rest of the campaign.

Bitter recriminations immediately broke out between Raglan, Lucan, Cardigan and other senior officers as to who was to blame for the devastating demise of the Light Brigade. Not only that, but the British had also suffered the loss of a number of prestigious naval guns, captured by the enemy. However, the Russians had demonstrably failed in their strategic aim to sever the British supply lines between Balaclava and Sevastopol, the vital naval base to which the Allies were now able to turn their full attention. The siege lasted for many months but eventually Sevastopol fell and the Russians sought terms for peace, including the return of Moldavia and Wallachia to the Ottoman Empire. Within weeks of the charge, Cardigan had

returned to England and was feted as a hero, until Lucan and other officers also returned home to give their version of events. In fact, Cardigan and Lucan continued their personal antagonistic rivalry through the columns of The Times newspaper, each accusing the other of blundering and military incompetence, until both men were promoted, appointed Knight Commanders of the Order of the Bath (a very British solution) and never allowed to serve in the field again, apart from occasional regimental parades and pageantry. Lord Raglan meanwhile had succumbed to dysentery and depression, and died in Crimea before the end of campaign.

Apart from the introduction of the new 'cardigan' and 'balaclava' woollen garments to offer some protection against the freezing winters, the Crimean War produced in other ways a number of important outcomes. Out of the total of 22,000 British deaths, only around 4600 occurred in actual combat but a staggering 17,400 soldiers died from disease (primarily cholera), mortal wounds, starvation or cold. Telegraphic communications had also started to develop so that news could reach England in a matter of days rather than weeks. The British public was appalled at the unnecessarily harsh and brutal conditions suffered by the ordinary soldiers in the extreme Crimean climate, seemingly ignored by most of the senior officers. From this emerged the establishment, for the first time, of proper nursing care for all ranks under the inspirational influence and personal efforts of Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and their staff of volunteers. Public opinion was also outraged by the display of weak and incompetent military leadership, resulting in catastrophic blunders that had plagued the entire campaign, glaringly epitomised by the fateful charge of the Light Brigade. For the first time, the war was

witnessed on the ground, and reported on, by members of the press,

notably William Russell of The Times, who would provide Tennyson with the material for his famous poem only a few weeks after the actual event. And finally, the Crimean War saw the introduction of the Victoria Cross award for gallantry for all ranks, forged initially from a Chinese bronze cannon.

So back to the original question – glorious charge or military blunder? The answer, as lies so often in both life and history, has to be an emphatic combination of both. But there can be no doubt where Tennyson's

sympathies lay, reflected in his inspirational poem – in spite of the catastrophic military blunders, it was the extraordinary and unquestioning courage of the ordinary trooper that won the admiration of the world.

Their's not to make reply.

Their's not to reason why,

Their's but to do and die:

Into the valley of Death

Rode the six hundred.

When can their glory fade?
O the wild charge they made!
All the world wonder'd.
Honour the charge they made!
Honour the Light Brigade,
Noble six hundred!


