# Thought for the Month

Moving into retirement after over forty years in full time employment I have had time to reflect.

I grew up in East Belfast moving from Marmont Park to Glenmachan at the age of thirteen. I enjoyed a happy childhood playing with friends who lived locally, many

of whom I am still in contact with today. I went to Strathearn School and as a family, we attended St. Mark's Dundela. As the 'Troubles' were at their worst at that time, our social life mainly revolved around the Church Community with Parish activities such as the



Choir, Guides and Badminton, all weekly events. On Saturday nights my father ran the Church Youth Club and engaged other parents to police the windows to ensure no alcohol made it into the Church Hall!

Family, cousins and friends filled our days before mobile phones and technology. I recall family picnics, days out, holidays and visits to grandparents in London – a happy childhood despite the situation in Belfast at the time. We regularly played in a field which is now Parkway Dual Carriageway - how times have changed!

Growing up, I was always taught that people are more important than possessions; a lesson made very clear at the start of Prep 7 when my priorities went very wrong! I was appointed a Junior School Prefect, told of my responsibilities, given my badge and told

to "wear it with pride". After school that day, I kept my uniform on, just to make sure everyone saw the badge! When bedtime came, to my horror the badge had fallen off my tunic. Where could it be? Everyone came out to search but unfortunately, it wasn't to be found. I went to bed very upset dreading my fate with the Headmistress the next day. It was a sleep less night however next morning at first light, the badge was located at the back door by my father – to my great relief! A lesson well learnt that it is never worth getting upset over things, even it was my cherished Prefect badge.

At university I judged the Eurovision Song Contest, joined the Student March

against cuts in Education and led a party of Guides to participate in the wedding of Charles and Diana. After graduating, I joined the Management Training Scheme with Marks and Spencer in London. The hours in retail were long and we worked hard dealing with the public and learning the importance of people and customer service. Royalty, TV stars...everyone had to be treated well.

After eight years, I returned to Northern Ireland as Personal Manager of the Altnagelvin Group of hospitals before joining Ulster Carpets, a family-owned global business. I was made a Board Director for Human Resources – a challenging and interesting role where teamwork and people were at the heart of the job.

I stumbled across John when he was Curate in St. Mark's Dundela and I was one of the Churchwardens. We married in St Mark's Dundela in 1999 when John was a Rector in Armagh Diocese, a great celebration with family and friends, and I moved to a country village for the first time – not quite East Belfast! I discovered very quickly that DIY was not one of the Rector's strengths and the Glebewardens in all our parishes have come to our rescue on more than one occasion!

Shortly after Charles was born in Armagh, we moved to Carryduff where Henry was born. Six years later, we were on the move back to East Belfast to St. Columba's in BT5. This was both exciting and daunting – the Rectory was huge and the boys were determined to stay in Inchmarlo (although they won't admit that today!) Parishioners and friends made us very welcome and filling the Rectory proved easier than convincing Charles and Henry that Campbell College would be a better option. Being in a position to raise the boys in the community where I grew up has been an amazing privilege for us as a family. The boys have had the opportunity of making friends and enjoying the same social circle as their cousins and the wider family. They have also enjoyed their Granny's close involvement in their academic and social lives and we benefited from her help with school pick up.

Growing up here in St. Columba's, Charles and Henry have been able to enjoy a childhood similar to mine, with the benefit of a close community and the people within it.

Looking back over the years at home and at work, without doubt, it is people; family, friends and the kindness of the Parish community that make a real difference.



#### **PARISH CHRISTMAS CARD**

Our Parish Christmas Card focuses on a shiny Christmas bauble topped with holly, depicting the brightly lit open church door and the sound of "Joy to the World" drifting out. It closely resembles the church door here at St Columba's, with the bright lights shining out and our choir singing a most joyous Christmas hymn. The bauble represents the world, surrounded by a halo of light, as Christ shines his light around the world to overcome darkness and sustain us in our faith.

The hymn "Joy to the World, the Lord is come! let Earth receive her King" is based on Genesis 3 and Psalm 98 and was written in 1719 by English minister Isaac Watts. It is enjoyed around the world for its simple praise



and easy lyrics, making it a firm favourite of adults and children alike.

Our church door is always open with a warm welcome for everyone as we share our friendship, fellowship and faith to all. The music drifting out is a lovely way to remember all of the music of Christmas, as we come together for our Advent and Christmas services. #### **A Christmas Reflection**

#### **Canon Walter Laverty**

I don't believe it! I am writing this on Armistice Day and already have seen a Christmas tree in the window of a neighbour's house. Likewise, I'm sure we know of those who buy Christmas presents in mid-summer. I could never be that organised!

By the time you receive this edition of "The Columban" we will only be a few days away from the Advent Service (Sunday 1st December). These four weeks before Christmas are traditionally a time of preparation and have all kinds of ancient customs of their own. In many churches, the Advent wreath is the focus of marking time before Christmas. Every week of the four weeks of dark December a candle is lit as we recall the great biblical heroes of our faith. As one candle is added to another, the wreath burns brighter until the large white central candle is lit on Christmas Day. This visibly draws our attention to Christ as the one true light. Alternatively, in many homes there will be the Advent Calendar – perhaps even with a sweet behind each door. If it's a religious calendar there will be a picture or biblical text.

Last week, at the parish Bible study, we came across a verse in 2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians, the book we have been studying since September. The verse reads as follows "You know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich" (2<sup>nd</sup> Cor. 8 V 9). The context is that St Paul was encouraging the Corinthian church to be generous in their giving to help the struggling church in Jerusalem. We, too, are reminded to be as generous as possible at any time but especially at Christmas since we are only too aware that many will have financial difficulties throughout these winter months.

St Paul's argument was taken to another level. He was reminding his hearers of a deeply theological implication. Christ was enjoying the rich life with his Father in heaven; bur laid aside that "richness" to be born into a humble human family and have an animal feeding trough as a cradle! St Paul continued to say that Christ did that for their sake so that they could become "rich" in the faith and knowledge of God. Likewise, that message comes down to us as well. Our Christmas joy is only complete when we recognise the great sacrifice Christ made for us by coming into the world so that we would have hope of salvation and receive, through our faith, the free gift of God's grace and the promise of eternal life.

May we use the Advent season to reflect on that thought among all other thoughts. In doing so, the timeless message of Christmas will fill our hearts and lives with the true and lasting joy that the secular world will never understand!

May you and yours have a blessed Christmas and a peaceful New Year.

## A Thought for Christmas

These notes are prepared on a dull and misty day in November when communities in our country and beyond are preparing for Christmas.

Last year, at least one council decided to greet its citizens with colourful banners wishing citizens a 'Happy Yuletide.' Was this an old-fashioned way of greeting people, or, a desire to be as politically correct as possible, and consequently, to offend nobody?

'Happy Yuletide'! What is the origin of that greeting? Well, it can be traced back to pre Christian times, when a mid-winter celebration associated with the themes of light, fire and feasting was commonplace in Ireland and elsewhere. The shortest day was observed as the nativity of the sun, after which the sun grew stronger in the sky. Maybe those who identified with such beliefs could be called the original 'sun worshippers'!!

There is no evidence in the Bible or elsewhere to suggest that Jesus was born on 25th.December. However, by the 5th.Century a religious leader like St. Augustine, was urging Christians not to celebrate the solemn day 'like the heathen on account of the sun, but, on account of him who is the Son of God – Jesus Christ'.

When I was ordained over fifty years ago, many conservative Christian congregations did not observe Christmas Day, simply because the date of the birth of Christ is not mentioned in the Bible. Our Christian tradition, along with many others, encourages people to share their faith together at Christmas time. Of course that does not preclude us from singing secular songs with sentimental words like that made known by Nat King Cole:- 'Jack Frost nipping at your nose: Yuletide carols being sung by the choir.'

I'm aware of very few, if any, of my non believing friends who take exception to the greeting 'Happy Christmas' I'm sure that opinion could be extended to the vast majority of those of other religions or none.

I trust that many parishioners and readers of the Columban can celebrate and observe the true significance of a great Christian festival which, we acknowledge, on 25th.December - the awesome fact that God came amongst us as a humble and vulnerable baby.

May the hope, the peace, the joy and the love represented by the birth in Bethlehem fill our lives and become part of all that we say or do. Whatever your circumstances may be in a troubled world, I, and my wife, Jenny, wish you a Happy Christmas.
