


Easter Vestry Address 2025

As a church, we work hard to provide **service** and outreach to parishioners in our local community and beyond. We welcome many new people at various times. Each person receives our very warm St Columba's welcome, which is an essential facet of our church.

2024 has been a wonderful year for completing projects and building on our successes on many fronts. Our theme this year is "Service". Service to God and each other is the greatest gift we can give.

As a busy and enthusiastic parish, St Columba's endeavours to deliver service in many forms to



parishioners, local community and overseas outreach. It is only made possible by the work of all of our parishioners and those who help, working diligently and kindly in so many ways.

CHURCH SERVICES

We are now using our Church and Hall much more frequently. Services, concerts as well as use of the church and hall by other local organisations have been greatly appreciated by our local community and beyond.

Each year we have a busy schedule of **services**, particularly at both Easter and Christmas. The attendance at these **services** has been gradually increasing, and I am delighted to report that our **Service** of Nine Lessons and Carols on Sunday 22nd December was packed to capacity. Family and friends gathered to prepare for Christmas and to enjoy the wonderful music and singing, all carefully led by our Parish Organist and Choral Director, Dr Joe McKee. We have also seen increasing numbers at our Midnight Eucharist on Christmas Eve and our ever-popular Christingle **service**.

Joe's enthusiasm for music excellence has been greatly appreciated by those in attendance. It is due to our wonderful musical heritage that we also hosted the BBC Radio Ulster live broadcast recording of another **service** here in St Columba's on Sunday 13th October.



Joe is supported by our Assistant Organist Brian Clements, Organist Emeritus Gerald Hill and Guest Organists Alasdair Maclaughlin, Graeme McCullough, Tristan Russcher and Phillip Elliott, our Parish Choir and our Cantors. who all provide such a wonderful musical tradition in St Columba's. Our music has attracted many visitors who enjoy our traditional liturgical Anglican services.

I thank those who lead the prayers and who read the lessons on Sundays, as well as our young parishioners who

participate at our All Age Worship **services**. It is wonderful that so many people are willing and able to assist!

On Sunday 19th April, we held a *Service* of Confirmation, where twelve candidates from St Columba's and one candidate from St Mark's, Dundela were confirmed by Bishop David McClay. This outreach to our young parishioners, as well as incorporating other churches, strengthens our *Service* to God and prepares the path for a strong future for St Columba's.

We enjoyed two parish concerts, on Wednesday 26th June and Saturday 16th November. Each recital was followed by refreshments, which lasted longer than the actual concerts!



Both were very well supported and enjoyed by parishioners, friends, neighbours and the greater community in attendance. The friendships and fellowships which naturally occur after our concerts and **services** binds people together and allows them to see what a **wonderfully engaging and friendly church we have**, all dedicated to the **service** to each other and to God.

Following a delightful Harvest **Service** on Sunday 6th October, our Harvest Lunch was served in the church hall by our wonderful and hard-working Catering Committee. We welcomed parishioners, family, friends and neighbours, and the hall was packed! The atmosphere was relaxed and fun, *and the lunch was exceptional!*



We held our annual *Service* of *Remembrance* and *Thanksgiving* for *Those Who Have Died* on Sunday 3rd November, as well as our *Blue Christmas Service* on Thursday 5th December. These reflective, quiet *services* were both well supported, and they provide a peaceful way to deal with sadness and stress during the dark months of late autumn and winter. We welcomed family, friends and neighbours to join us, and several people remarked how beneficial these *services* have been to them.

On Thursday mornings 10.30am, our Holy Communion **service** continues to grow and

thrive. It is a short 30 minute **service** which includes a reflection, organ voluntaries and is followed by refreshments which are kindly hosted by members of the congregation. We use the Prayer List, which is a list of first names, (no surnames for privacy except when praying for bereaved families), kindly supplied by **Liz McCaughey** who manages the names each month and emails them to a group of prayerful parishioners who want to help. Everyone is welcome to join us – it is a friendly way to attend church midweek.

We thank our Audio Team who attend to our sound system during various services and events: David Deane, Alan Bijo, Caroline Fairley, Ian Johnston and Alan Boyd. The recorded services are sent to Jonathan Stewart (our Webmaster) who very kindly uploads them onto our website, so that those who cannot attend for whatever reason are still able to benefit from them. I thank Jonathan for all his great work.

The sharing of **services** during Holy Week with Knock Methodist Church is a wonderful blessing and source of outreach to incorporate members of our local community.

In addition to **services**, we also have a church Decorating Team, who kindly take the time to "dress" the church for various occasions and services. This team, led by **Fiona Haldane and Eleanor Launchbury**, quietly meet and along with a willing team of helpers, they decorate the church to enhance the atmosphere at our **services**. We thank everyone involved in this aspect of our worship.



Church flowers are an important way to remember or celebrate occasions and our flower rota is busy with people wanting to donate flowers. Here is a photo of flowers from the wedding of Jason and Hannah Patterson in December, kindly donated to the church. Donating bouquets and floral arrangements following a wedding is one way to allow the stunning flower arrangements to be enjoyed by many other people! ORGANISATIONS

Following on from our Service of Dedication for our Parish Organisation leaders on



Sunday 1st September, we held our annual meeting of Organisational Leaders on Wednesday 11th September 2024. The aim of this is to remind everyone about our housekeeping and data protection guidelines. We provide information regarding many aspects, and the meeting was well-attended and enthusiastic.

In 2024, we were delighted to welcome the 4th & 24th Belfast Scouts to our church in September. Since they have joined us, they have worked very hard at clearing out the church hall, selling old chairs.

tidying up around the grounds and assisting at our services. They have brought great joy and delight to our parish, all under the careful leadership of lain Hall and his team of assistants. I thank them all very much for their hard work, and for their assistance in the hall as we do our best to make use of our hall facilities in a regular way.

Scouts have made a huge positive impact to our church, and so it was with great delight that we then welcomed Cub Scouts in January 2025. The Cubs meet on Wednesday evenings, under the guidance of Gareth McAuley and his assistants. They have brought even more enthusiasm and provide a warm and friendly way for our young people to meet and engage while serving God.

It is a great blessing to have both of these organisations in our parish. It is important to build for the future, and having young people involved is one way in which we can build and strengthen our parish for future generations, as well as reaching out to serve our community more effectively.

We have also seen a transition from Men's Club, which was focused on indoor bowling, to Men's Forum, where the focus is in providing a space for the men in our parish to share time, activities and fellowship together. They have a new and updated range of activities and encourage new members to join!

This year marks the 10th Anniversary of our **Railway & Model Club**, who enthusiastically support our church in many ways. The team engage with local churches and businesses as well as other Railway and Model clubs, hosting and attending exhibitions and spreading

good will and outreach to the greater community. The success of this club is down to this enthusiasm and positive attitude of the club members.

Our organisations have all had successful meetings and events during the year, and I thank all of our Parish Organisation Leaders and their committees for their hard work and effort as we continue to welcome guest speakers and guests to our church.



FINANCE

I am delighted to report that despite many issues facing financial institutions, St Columba's has continued to maintain a steady and secure financial position. While this is a wonderful position to be in, **we cannot become complacent.** We need to continue to build on our hard work by encouraging families to set up Standing Orders to financially contribute to our work here at St Columba's.

We are very pleased to support the work of some parishioners who have worked overseas on projects, including **Lucy Armstrong** who travelled to Romania with Methodist College for *School Aid Romania* in January; **Hazel Macpherson** who will be going to Nairobi with *Jengana* during the summer, and **Patrick Whiteside** who will be going to Tanzania with *GOMAD*, to work in the slums and assist with local projects. These young people need our support as they go out into the world to see poverty and hardship on a huge scale, and to help where they can as they work with others in the **service** to these communities.

We were also in a position to donate £1,000 using our Charity & Mission contributions to 13 charities before Christmas. These charities have been extremely grateful for your support, and I thank you for your kind donations on a regular basis.



During our Patronal Festival on Sunday 9th June, I dedicated the new space at the front of the church in memory of Hazel Reid, who's generous bequest made this work possible. The new front space has now been furnished with beautiful chairs, which allows for better use of the space. This is especially true at our large services and on Thursday mornings. We can allow people to sit with their families instead of sitting in the aisles if they are wheelchair users. Providing this dignified and comfortable space has been a goal of our church for many years, and so it has been warmly welcomed by many. This wonderful

space is being used more frequently in new and refreshing ways, continually changing to suit the parish needs.

The chairs were the extremely kind gift of David Craig and his family in memory of his wife Louise, who was a most loyal and dedicated parishioner. We thank them most gratefully for their generosity and support.

I thank both **Brian Acheson**, our Honorary Treasurer, and **Victor Dukelow**, our Assistant Honorary Treasurer, along with our Gift Aid Secretary **Jack Dunlop**, for all of their hard work during the year, making sure that we have completed all relevant paperwork for claims, paid our suppliers and trade workers, and kept a tight rein on our finances by meeting with the Select Vestry and Finance Committee to make sure that we are using the best ways to save money and cut costs.

I thank the members of our **Counting Team** who carefully count and lodge our money. This is a very important part of our work, and the team diligently and quietly perform their duties in a most professional way.

I also thank our members of the **Finance**, **Property**, **Cleaning and Catering Committees as well as our Select Vestry**, who so generously give of their time and talents in **service** to St Columba's.

While we will always accept cash, our preference is for Money Transfers or Standing Orders, as this means that less cash is required, and the money is quickly and securely transferred directly into our accounts. There will be much more work on this aspect of giving as we examine new ways to contribute and so



reduce cash handling. This will roll out this year as we are required to make changes to our financial software where we record our donations. Keep an eye out for more information soon!

We are extremely grateful to those parishioners who Gift Aid their donations. Gift Aid is a wonderful way to enhance your gift to St Columba's by 25%, without having to spend you own money. It is a government scheme which boosts our income greatly. In 2024 we claimed £33,469.12 in Gift Aid, and we encourage anyone who is eligible but who has not yet signed up, to consider enhancing their gift to the church in this way. We continue to ask those who do not contribute financially to assist us by considering the use of Standing Order, which allows us to plan financially, as well as those who can Gift Aid to do so. requirement by using our church building in various capacities- not just for **services**, weddings, funerals and baptisms.

This will be a timely opportunity for us to allow our Christian Faith to grow and develop to sustain us in the opportunities and challenges of daily life. I am delighted that the former Dean of Down Cathedral, The Very Reverend Henry Hull will be the preacher at these services. I hope you will be able to join us in St. Columba's throughout Lent.

This introduction gives information about Dean Hull and about his series of sermons.

Very Reverend Henry Hull retired from full time ministry last year after serving as Dean of Down since 2006 and the Rector of the Lecale area since 2001.

Henry is originally from Belfast and was educated at Grosvenor High School and Queens University.

Prior to ordination he had been a teacher of RE in Portadown, and for some years served on the staff of the General Synod of the Church of England, where he was member of the Council

for Christian Unity.

He was ordained in the Diocese of Southwark and was a Team Vicar in South East London before his appointment to the Diocese of Down and Dromore. Henry has on previous occasions enjoyed sharing in services in St Columba's. He is married to Geraldine, they have four grown up children and recently welcomed their tenth grandchild.

They are now living in Dundonald and currently Henry is assisting in St Molua's during their vacancy.

The theme for our six Wednesdays in Lent is "Living out our faith amidst the challenges of daily life".

We hope to briefly consider a number of topics including family life; integrity in the workplace; anxiety; health; generosity and service.

Each evening there will be a short scriptural reflection linked with some suggestions as to how we might apply it in a practical way in our lives. We begin on Ash Wednesday considering how to put into practice the Lenten themes of prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Prayers for your thoughts and comfort



Many readers of the Columban will recall being introduced at school to the writings of William Shakespeare. Amongst his writings that I was obliged to study was 'Julius Caesar' with its famous quote to the ruler of ancient Rome that he should 'beware of the ides of March'. It was prophetic because on that day Julius Caesar was assassinated in 44B.C.

The ides of March marked the beginning of a new year (15thMarch) and was observed throughout much of the ancient world until the introduction of the Julian calendar, when the new year was fixed on 1stJanuary.

March was named after the Roman god – Mars. Incidentally, we are reminded of the ancient calendar each year between September (the seventh month) and December (the tenth month).

March marked the beginning of the season of growth. Today, many people consider it to be the beginning of Spring.

This year, 2025, we will observe the beginning of Lent in March on Ash Wednesday (5th.March). A few prayers have been chosen to coincide with these events.

In March, we celebrate the festival of Patrick, our national saint, and also the Annunciation to Mary (25thMarch) that she would be the mother of Jesus. Prayers are included in recognition of these dates and also a prayer appropriate for use on Mothering Sunday (30thMarch)

Regardless of the month, many subjects and petitions are worthy of note. Some are included in this issue. Should you wish any other subjects to be highlighted, please discuss the matter with the Rector.

Hopefully, you will find some of the material and prayers, helpful.

PRAYERS for use ANY DAY, and in the month of MARCH

Lord of all time, help me to enter each day in peace. Thoughtful of who I am to myself, and others, and mindful that my words may influence positively those I meet, help me to walk gently, and to speak only after I have listened well. Enable me to enter each day without fear, remembering your gifts to me, and looking forward to many blessings to come. May I welcome your love today, and, in the days to come. **Amen**

Father, thank you for carrying me through life's winter season, and bringing me into the new springtime season of hope. Thank you for lessons I have been taught in winter, including lessons of perseverance, rest and trust. Thank you for encouraging me to look ahead, and for your love which never changes. **Amen**

PRAYERS in SPRINGTIME

Lord God, I pray that the season of Spring will be one of growth in my life. Let every bloom and emerging flower remind me of your grace. Let the months ahead give birth in my soul to warm thoughts and kind gestures. **Amen**

Lord, thank you for Springtime and the hope of warmer, longer and brighter days. Thank you that things are coming alive around us. Now, we ask that we may see in the sunlight and rain and wind, reminders that you bring renewal into our world and lives, and enable us to walk with you into new moments of opportunity. **Amen**

ASH WEDNESDAY

God our Father, as we begin our Lenten journey, help us to see that your love is always with us. During these forty days, change our hearts Lord, so that, by our prayer, and above all the deep well of your grace, we may greet one another, transformed as your Easter people. **Amen**

Grant Lord, that by the observance of this Lent, we may advance in the knowledge of the mystery of Christ, and show forth his mind in conduct worthy of our calling, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

ST. PATRICK

God our Father, you sent Patrick to preach the Good News of the Gospel to the people of Ireland. With your help, may all Christians proclaim your love. Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**

ANNUNCIATION to MARY (25th) and MOTHERING SUNDAY (30th)

God our Father, we celebrate the news given to Mary that she would be the mother of Jesus.

We thank you for all those who have mothered us throughout our lives. We think of those who have held us, fed us, cared for us, comforted us, challenged and encouraged us.

We think of new mothers, experiencing changes in their lives: mothers who may be raising children on their own: mothers whose relationships are going through difficult times: mothers who suffer from abuse: all men and women who have assumed the role of a parent or carer: those who grieve the loss of a mother or child. Grant all for whom we pray, joy, courage, hope and healing. We ask this in the name of the one who knew a mother's and parental love, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

(Think of the Mothers Union in your prayers)


