RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioner,

THANK YOU

In this the first Columban of 2025 I wish you and your family God's richest Blessing for 2025 and express my grateful thanks for your support. In this midst of busy diaries and challenges I am extremely thankful that St. Columba's is a vibrant church with great friendship and fellowship enabling our Christian faith to grow. This is due to your loyalty and the welcome you give to our visitors – some of whom have joined the parish. Thank you for your ongoing support and encouragement.

OVERSEAS PROJECTS

2025 has started with the good news that three parishioners have been selected to travel overseas with groups of young people to assist those in great need.

Lucy Armstrong has just returned from Brasov in Romania with the charity School Aid Romania, with a group of 20 pupils from Methodist College. Their work involved:

- $\bullet \ \ Delivering \ food \ parcels \ to \ a \ village \ which \ gets \ no \ support \ from \ the \ government$
- Visiting an abandoned baby unit to deliver nappies, blankets and baby clothes.
- Delivering cleaning materials and food to orphanages, spending time playing with the children and giving them toys.

Patrick Whiteside will be traveling to Musoma which is in the Mara region of Tanzania. Musoma is in the North of Tanzania, about 1.5 hours from the Kenyan/Tanzanian border and a couple of hours from the Serengeti National Park. He will be getting involved in lots of community development projects including building water tanks, goat sheds, youth activities and healthcare programmes during the summer.

Hazel Macpherson will be travelling to Kenya with Jengana in July. She will be involved in home visits to slum-based families and street feeding in Nairobi, volunteering at the Kipepeo Home for orphaned and abandoned children, and helping at a rehabilitation home for street boys. She will also be assisting with a rural building project, visit slum schools, and contribute to manual work. She will also participate in Christian activities like church services, prayer, and a Kids' Bible club.

Lucy Armstrong hosted refreshments a few weeks ago in church for the Romanian project which was generously supported. Both Patrick Whiteside and Hazel Macpherson will each have a similar opportunity to raise money for their projects.

An important part of our parish work is to support overseas projects assisting those in great need. This is best done when parishioners are travelling overseas, and we can learn directly about their experiences through their Columban articles and presentations in church. Please remember them, their families and the individual projects in your prayers. We also have the reassurance that all the money raised will be allocated directly to these projects. The Select Vestry is also providing financial support for each of those projects from your Charity and Mission contributions.

These are good news stories full of hope providing much needed financial and prayerful support to those overseas in such great need.

Bible Study

Many of the liturgical readings will be from "Hebrews" especially as we journey through Holy Week! We can take comfort and agree with the author's conviction that Jesus Christ is "the same yesterday and today and forever" (Chapter 13 v.8). All very welcome especially anyone for the first time – including men! Why not?

Thought for the Month

Cycling is my favourite leisure activity. I
was in my late forties before I discovered
the joys of cycling so, despite my best
efforts, I had left it too late to achieve
any success in competitive cycling.
However I have always been inspired
by the achievements of professional
cyclists. In particular, Sir Chris Hoy has been a

great source of inspiration.



Ronny Martin

Chris is an eleven-time world champion, and at his home Olympics in London in 2012 he held off the world's best sprinters to win Olympic gold, and became the first British athlete in history to win six Olympic golds. After retiring from competitive cycling in 2013 Chris became involved in Motorsport, including racing in the world's most demanding motorsport endurance race, 24 Hours of Le Mans, in June 2016. He is also an award-winning author, accomplished and inspirational speaker, TV pundit, business owner and mental health advocate.

In September 2023 Chris faced a life changing moment when he found out that an ache in his shoulder was in fact a tumour, and that he had incurable Stage 4 cancer. In his book entitled "All That

Matters" Chris shares the next phase of his extraordinary life with exceptional bravery. He looks over the challenges he has faced thus far, and he shares how he has used these experiences to find ways to focus on the things that matter, showing us how to do the same.

As an elite athlete Chris had always prided himself on his mental strength, but he found that the mental effects of his diagnosis knocked him for six, and presented a much bigger challenge than dealing with the physical side effects of his chemotherapy treatment. He reflects that getting on his bike again played a big part in his recovery. Simply being out in the fresh air cycling along country lanes for a couple of hours most days helped him feel much better. He began to focus on enjoying the simple things in life, and this has been a huge and healthy shift in his mentality. He tries to immerse himself a lot more in the present moment, and is able to find pleasure in the more mundane aspects of life. As an Olympian Chris was always focused on following his dreams, but he has now come to realise that life is not here to be won or lost. It is here just to be lived.

In the concluding chapter of his memoir "All That Matters" Chris reflects that it is helpful to remember that the future doesn't exist, it is merely a concept in our minds which we may or may not have control over. Worrying about what might happen, trying to predict the future, is wasting our energy on something

that doesn't exist. The reality of our life is always now. The past is a memory and the future is simply a thought.

It is a privilege to be able to enjoy the here and now, and to appreciate the simple things in life.

Prayers for your thoughts and comfort



One of my earliest memories of school days was of my Primary teacher writing the date – 1st. February – on the blackboard, and informing us that it was St. Brigid's Day- the first day of Spring. Maybe that was wishful thinking, although the pre-Christian Celtic calendar began the season on that date, calling the new season 'Imbolc.' It is considered to be halfway between the Winter Solstice (21st. Dec.) and the Spring Equinox (22nd. Mar.). Perhaps it is of interest to some readers that a new Public Holiday was introduced last year in the Republic, on the Monday nearest St. Brigid's Day. While we may not be enjoying 'the darling buds of May', the first signs of life should be appearing on trees and at ground level. For that reason, a prayer anticipating Spring is included this month.

At the time of writing, a new President has been inaugurated in USA: a new Prime Minister is about to be appointed in Canada while a new government has been formed in the Irish Republic. It is right that we pray for all political leaders, whether we share their views or otherwise, aware that they may have the means of contributing to a cessation of violence in troubled parts of the world, as well as ensuring that the underprivileged and vulnerable in society can be assisted in achieving a better standard of living. Perhaps as Christians we should pray believing that 'hope springs eternal.'

Easter will not occur until late April this year so prayers and subjects appropriate to Lent will not feature until the March issue.

Finally, if there are subjects you would like to see included at some stage, please speak to the rector.

It is hoped that you will find some of the prayers and material helpful and appropriate.

Note:- Brigid is honoured as one of the great Irish saints together with Patrick and Columba. She is associated with Kildare where the cathedral is named in her honour. Tradition suggests that she died on 1st.Feb. 525 – exactly 1500 years ago!!

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple (known as Candlemas) 2nd. February

Almighty God, you fulfilled the hopes of Simeon and Anna who welcomed the Messiah in the Temple. Complete in us your will so that in Christ we may see your salvation, for he is Lord for ever and ever. **Amen**

Note:- Read St.Luke 2 v. 22 to 39, which includes the Song of Simeon or Nunc Dimittis. Candlemas is celebrated in many churches and is considered to be the conclusion of the Christmas/Epiphany seasons.

Leaders and Politicians (Worldwide)

Almighty God, the Lord of all nations, we pray for all who have been appointed to positions of leadership. Give them vision to see beyond their own political agenda, and integrity in their words and actions. Grant that their service to people and nations may promote the welfare and peace of mankind, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

Leaders in Society (National & Local)

Lord God, in our prayers, we think of all men and women who can influence the life of society. We think of those who are involved in politics: those who make and administer our laws and strive to ensure security in our communities: those who influence public opinion through the radio, press and television: those who teach and influence in beneficial ways the young. May they and we recognise responsibility to the nation and locality, that people may be influenced for what is good, and not evil: for what is true and not false, and all for the glory of your name. **Amen**

Victims of War & Violence

Father of mercy, whose son, Jesus Christ, ministered to those in need, we pray for all who suffer through war, by loss of loved ones, friends or homes. Look upon our world, torn apart by violence and aggression, and encourage those who work for peace, through Him who reconciled people and nations with God, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

THE REGISTER OF VESTRY MEMBERS

During this month, the Register of Vestry Members is open for review and is available for inspection from the Churchwardens. This Register is separate from the Parish Database and only those whose names appear on it are eligible (subject to their consent) at the Annual Vestry Meeting for nomination and election to the Select Vestry. In addition, those parishioners are entitled to vote at the elections during the Annual Easter Vestry Meeting.

If your name is not already on the Register of Vestry Members and you wish to have it added, you are required to:

- Be over 18 years of age
- Be a contributor to church funds in a recognised form (Free Will Offering Envelopes or Standing Order). Please contact the Parish Administrator, Karen Patterson (028 9065 6891) if you wish to support the work of St Columba's in this way.
- Sign a Form of Declaration, which can be obtained from the Churchwardens - please contact them directly. These completed forms need to be returned to them by Sunday 23rd February 2025.
- Should a parishioner's financial contribution to the parish have lapsed for a period of 12 months or more, their name may be removed from the Register of Vestry Members in agreement with the Select Vestry Review Meeting which will take place on Thursday 27th February at 7.30pm.
- It is the responsibility of parishioners to ensure that they are fully compliant with these requirements before the review meeting on Thursday 27th February. St Columba's, along with other parishes, is now registered as an individual charity with the Charity Commission (N.I.). As a recent communication form the Diocesan Office stated,

"Each member of the Select Vestry is considered as a Trustee of their parish –

that is nothing new in terms of their responsibilities, it is just that these have been formalised under charity legislation".

The Supplementary Guidance on Charity Trustees provides this additional information for your assistance:

Anyone who is elected as a member of a Select Vestry must not be disqualified from being a trustee of a charity. Those disqualified under the Charities Act from acting as a trustee are anyone who:

- Has been convicted of an offence involving deception or dishonesty, unless the conviction is spent conviction under to Rehabilitation of Offenders (NI) Order 1978.
- Is an undischarged bankrupt or has made a voluntary arrangement with creditors
- Has previously been removed as a trustee by the Commission or by the Court
- Is subject to disqualification under company legislation.

It is the responsibility of anyone who might fall into any of these categories, not to make themselves available for election to the Select Vestry.

Railway and Model Club 2014-2024


Happy New Year to you all.
