CHURCH OF IRELAND GAZETTE SPOTLIGHT ARTICLE ON ST. COLUMBA'S

I was delighted to read in the September edition of the Church of Ireland Gazette that St. Columba's featured in the Spotlight article. 

BIBLE STUDY

For centuries the church has recited the words of the ancient Nicene Creed which was drawn up in the year 325 A.D. This means that this year marks its 1700th anniversary.

In recognition of this we shall be exploring the teaching of this as backed up by scriptural references. We shall be following a booklet published recently by the Church of England entitled "We Believe" which consists of small chapters for discussion. Each chapter



looks at a different clause as found in the creed. The Introduction to the booklet says: "(The Creed) unites believers across time and space in a shared confession of who God is and what he has done in Jesus Christ....... It is much more than a formula: it is a declaration of faith, hope and love binding us to the communion of saints and to Christ himself."

It may seem a little trite for the Scoutmaster to rehearse a well worn motto, but Lord Baden Powell's chosen motto of "Be prepared" is truly an inspirational theme for us all. Being prepared is something that may

actually be innate or as a consequence of training or life skills, but there's seldom anything new under the sun that we can't face because we are *prepared*.

Twenty five years ago while dropping off my son to the Beavers at Knock my old Cub Akela (leader) asked if I had considered helping out with the scouts. I hadn't given it much thought but I discovered membership was down to 8 scouts, well below the numbers I recalled from childhood and the leaders were busy chaps frequently unable to offer a programme due to work commitments. In a short time I found myself as the scoutmaster with the remit of running the troop and actively recruiting new scouts into the troop. The Navy might have

called it 'Press Gangs'.

I wasn't convinced I had the capabilities to lead scouting, but on reflection my own scouting journey had *prepared* me for the responsibility, duty of care and passing on skills to scouts on their journey to adulthood. Skills acquired as a scout in team work, challenges, camp craft and cooking the best egg banjos ever made gave me an understanding of strengths and weaknesses of those in the troop as a boy scout and *prepared* me for a lifetime professionally in leadership. My own Scoutmaster handed these skills down to me and while I didn't realise it as a rowdy teenager, being *prepared* was a seminal lesson.

Preparation can be arduous and perhaps even tedious. Running up the hills in Stormont estate to Carson's monument in pre-season training 'prepared' me for the sprint and last ditch (Norman Hunter) tackles as an amateur footballer or the hours of golf practice hitting hundreds of golf balls 'prepared' me for matches representing Shandon against other clubs while spectators tutted at the odd missed putt or rattled coins to distract the next tee shot. Would I have wanted to enter the fray without being prepared?

Absolutely not and that's one of the lessons I reinforce to scouts at the importance of being *prepared* for whatever comes their way whether they expect it or not and if they aren't expecting it, they should have a strategy of preparedness to use in any eventuality.

Without disclosing too much, in 2019 a significant event impacted on my family and I. What occurred was not something I genuinely feel I was prepared for but just as I see now how my journey as a scout and scoutmaster prepared me for life's journey, I understand that within that moment, Christ was preparing me for something else. That something else was to appreciate that no matter how well we *prepare* as individuals, as families or at work, everything is in His hands and He prepares the way of all things. The truth is to understand how the Lord controls everything and we need is to be *prepared* for whatever He needs us to do when that call comes to us no matter when.

Readers of this section of the Columban will be aware that my introductory remarks include frequently reference to weather conditions, and the seasons of the year.

One of the best known early 19th Century English romantic poets, John Keats, was considered to be essential reading at secondary school. Most of us were introduced to his poem, 'Ode to Autumn', and maybe compelled to recite the lines beginning:- 'Seasons of mists and mellow fruitfulness.' In another example, when reflecting on human life, Keats states that each life had four seasons – the spring of childhood: the summer of youth: the autumn of middle age, and the winter of old age. Fairly obvious, we may think, but no human life can be guaranteed the four seasons. In that respect, life can be an uneven playing field. Perhaps Keats acknowledges that fact when he states that 'to live is to be shaped by beauty and loss, in turn.'

Many of the prayers included each month recognise the trials and tribulations, as well as the joys and opportunities experienced in human life. We are approaching the central point in the autumn season. It can be characterised by natural beauty as the leaves change colour, but also by a reduction in daylight leading to darker evenings. You may see a similarity with your own life currently. Whatever your circumstances may be, hopefully you will find one or more of this month's prayers helpful, and, perhaps, thought provoking.

Standing Order Giving

From The Parish Finance Team

Let us start by thanking you, the parishioners, for your very generous financial support – your regular and reliable giving makes possible everything that we value in St Columba's. However, this is a "call to action".

Standing Orders

In this article, we would like to focus on bank Standing Orders. This way of giving has grown to become our most important form of income. In our 2024 accounts "Unrestricted Funds" were stated at almost £150,000. This is the money we use to meet our regular running costs (salaries, utilities, property maintenance etc.). Over 70% of these funds are collected by Standing Order.

There are many benefits to the parish. These include: lower costs (in banking charges and envelopes); increased security (elimination of cash and cheques); and, very importantly, reliability. We saw, during Covid lockdowns, many parishes who had not promoted Standing Orders encounter serious financial challenges.

Consider Making the Move

We encourage those who have not yet moved to Standing Orders to consider making a change. We now have over 230 parishioners using Standing Orders to make their Free-Will Offering every month. So, if you have not yet done so, please consider making this change.

Already Giving by Standing Order?

In our experience, there is only one disadvantage of Standing Orders - inflation. Last year, it cost £201,440 to run the parish. The comparable figure in 2021 was £154,573. This is well over a 30% increase in three years. Some of our costs increased by much more than this. Our gas bill rose by over 30% in 2024 alone, and we moved supplier to get better pricing. Mostly however, we have no control of rising costs and need to look to our income sources to keep pace. Unfortunately, Standing Orders, once set up, remain at the same value unless the parishioner takes action to make an increase. Indeed, many parishioners have done so. Overall

however, the average increase in standing orders amounts to only a small fraction of our cost increases.

30% of those giving by standing order are already giving £50 or more per month. Not everyone's circumstances will allow them to be this generous. All we ask is that you consider your personal circumstances and whether you are able to make an increase in the context of our rising costs.

If you have not done so already, please consider whether you are able to afford an increase in the value of your Standing Order.
